A burst of platinum

District 20 has experienced a sudden abundance of platinum.

In a span of three months, the number of Platinum Life Masters has more than doubled from four to nine.

The first member of this bumper crop to go over 10,000 masterpoints was Ed Ulman, as reported in January.

Jeff Roman, who moved from Alexandria VA to Bend OR earlier last year, eventually officially transferred into the district, bringing more than 16,000 points with him.

Lucky number seven was Hendrik Sharples of Brush Prairie WA, who crossed the line in December.

The first of 2014 was Tom Lum of Honolulu HI.

Then, on Jan. 23, former district president Jeff Taylor got his 10,000th point playing at a club game in Eugene, bringing the total to nine.

A little over a year ago, there were only three: Ross Rainwater, Godfrey Chang of Hawaii and Betty Rossmann, Ulman's mother-in-law. In 2012, Dutch pro Huub Bertens moved to Bend.

District honors education liaison

In Larry Cohen, Seville lands prominent speaker at regional for third time

Congratulations to Mary Alice Seville, our hardworking Educational Liaison, who received a special award from the District 20 board for her accomplishments. Mary Alice pioneered a popular feature for the biennial Education Festival: classes taught by a nationally known bridge author.

In 2011 she brought Barbara Seagram to Seaside, and in 2013 Jerry Helms. Now she has Larry Cohen committed for the 2015 Education Festival in Eugene. Arranging for these personalities is not an easy task, and has required many hours of negotiations, but having them gives our regionals a special appeal to I/N players, as well as to bridge educators.

Mary Alice has also done an outstanding job in supporting our bridge teachers, including promoting the Learn Bridge in a Day program, facilitating ACBL Education Foundation grants, and arranging for ACBL-certified teacher training at our biennial Education Festivals.

When 'hand of the century' arrives, are you ready?

It was the Saturday afternoon session of the Portland sectional. I arrived at table 3, where John Ashton and Eric Stoltz were.

"Maybe you'll pick up the hand of the century and have something to write about," Stoltz suggested.

I hoped nothing so momentous would occur at that table. And proceeded to go down in a makeable 3♠.

I normally just like to write about things that amuse me, but challenge accepted: the quest to find the hand of the century in time for this column was on.

A month later, at the Oregon Trail Regional, the first plausible candidate surfaced in a hand Stoltz held:

♠— ♥A6 ♦AK3 ♣AKQJ9643

You can make 5♣ without seeing the dummy.

In the hypothetical auction, altered to cater to devices by used by those present

for the after-game discussion in the hotel bar, you open 2♣, LHO overcalls 2♠, and partner doubles to show a bad hand.

Though the ♦Q or a useful doubleton is all that's needed for slam, no one would admit to trying for 6♣, as our hero did. Take the sure 5♣, our company all agreed.

"If I wanted to get to 6♣, I'd bid 5♣," said Dan Hoekstra.

Isn't 5♣ natural? — suggesting the overcaller has psyched — someone asked.

Hoekstra replied he'd let the opponents play in 2♣ doubled if he held eight of their suit. "I think I have some defense against it," he joked.

Hypothetical bids placed, the dummy was revealed:

♠Q8632 ♥94 ♦864 ♣1072

With the wrong red doubleton, 6♣ is a goner. Alas, the search went on.

A few days later, I was in the last round

First times

It was unusual for sure

I learned how to play bridge before college, and played a bit in college and a few years after. I thought I was pretty good! In the summer of 1969, two friends and I decided to take a weekend trip and ride the Alaska State Ferry from Anchorage to Kodiak back. The first evening I saw a foursome playing bridge in the dining room and decided that if they needed someone to fill in, I'd do it. The next morning there was a public address announcement looking for a bridge player. I was the first and only one to show up.

We played for several hours including a rough crossing of the Shelikoff straits. We were oblivious to the rocking. At the end of the trip, I found out they were all novice duplicate players. They suggested I should give duplicate a try. "No way," I thought, not even sure what "duplicate" meant.

Six months passed, and I had quit my job when I saw two of them in the Safeway. They brought up duplicate again and having nothing to do with my time except job search, I gave the club owner, "Mary O," a call. She set me up with Tony for a Wednesday night novice game. Tony was a nice man willing to play with me even though I knew only Stayman and Blackwood. He did, however, want to play Unusual Notrump. Being young, I said: "Sure! Just tell me what that means."

He explained that if he overcalled one of a major with 2NT, he was 5-5 in the minors and I should bid my best minor. Who thought that it would ever come up? Just a few boards into the game, I was getting used to "duplicate logistics" when my left hand opponent opened 1♠; Tony overcalled 2NT; pass; pass by me. Oops, not a good board.

Tony took it well and again explained what 2NT meant. I was sure it wouldn't happen again that night, but several boards later, LHO opened 1♥; Tony overcalled 2NT; pass; and you guessed it, I passed again! Tony agreed to play with me the next week even before the scoring was done. Even with those two blunders we placed second out of eight and earned 0.22 masterpoints. I had no idea what masterpoints were, but I was hooked.

The Choices: How do I respond with 6-6?

At a recent club game, pard picked up the following hand:

♠KQ9542 ♥Q108632 ♦7 ♣—

Pard then heard me open 2NT! Can you imagine? Oh but what to bid?

Have you discussed such distributional hands with your partners? The trend a few years ago over 1NT openers was to bid 3-level for 5-5 in majors; 3♥ being weak, and 3♠ being strong. But have you ever discussed 6-6 hands either in the majors or the minors? And how to bid them over 2NT?

After asking several players how they would bid this, the most popular was to transfer to spades and then RKC, settling on the 6♠ contract. But

what if hearts is the better contract? Our auction was:

Mona	LHO	Partner	RHO
2NT	Pass	3♣ ¹	Pass
3NT	Pass	4♣	Pass
Pass	5♣	5♥	Pass
6♠	All Pass

Yes, it was an interesting auction. My pass after 4♣ was to play. Partner has some kind of major-suited hand 5-4, 5-5, or possibly 6-5. If the opponents hadn't been so helpful, we would have played 4♣ like most of the field. The question that went through my mind after the 5♥ call, was "What is partner doing?" I decided he had a good 6-6 hand and bid slam.

of an evening side game when Don Lowry came and told me to find him in the bar when I was finished. He'd found it — the hand of the century. First, his hand:

♠— ♥75 ♦KQ975 ♣A87642

Vulnerable as dealer, Lowry opened an offbeat weak 2♦, LHO bid 2♠, doubled by partner Hoekstra, and everybody passed.

Hoekstra led the ♦A and dummy hit:

♠— ♥Q982 ♦J8643 ♣QJ53

Hoekstra continued with the ♣K and then the ♠K to declarer's ♠A. Declarer played a low club (Hoekstra discarding a heart) to Lowry's ♣A. Lowry cashed his ♦K, Hoekstra pitching another heart, and then led a heart to Hoekstra's ♥A.

So what was the hand of the century?

Defending 2♠ doubled, Hoekstra held:

♠KQ1097642 ♥A64 ♦A ♣K.

Looks like he had some defense against it! Declarer got only three tricks: the ♠AJ8.

Harris: Visits Australia, New Zealand before Reno, Hawaii

Last fall I was out of the country for a month, on a tour called Bridge Down Under, traveling to New Zealand and Australia with a group of 47, all but three of whom play bridge. We played at nine different bridge clubs in the two countries, and enjoyed meeting many wonderful people. The hosts were incredibly welcoming, and I was impressed by the size of the club facilities, all but one of which were dedicated to bridge.

The game is the same as in the USA, although some of our opponents played the Acol system (4-card majors, etc.) The principal difference at the table is that instead of using bidding boxes, they record the bids for each hand on a preprinted form, approximately 6"

square. When the bidding is complete, the form stays on the table during the first trick, then is turned over, to be discarded.

After returning home, I played in regionals in Rancho Mirage CA (close to our winter home in Palm Springs) and Reno in December, and in Honolulu in January.

In Reno, there were 16 tables of middle and high school students from Reno Youth Bridge. RYB is a charitable organization chaired by bridge teacher Kathy Lane that provides after-school lessons to 14 schools in the Washoe County School District, as well as organized inter-school competition.

High-performing students can win gift certificates at local department stores, and the first prize is a \$1,000 college scholarship. Prizes and the costs of running this program (at \$1900 per school) are underwritten by generous donations from the community. Youth bridge among middle school students is also a growing interest in Portland, and I would welcome the opportunity to learn about any similar programs elsewhere in our district.

First time at Hawaii Regional

This year was my first time at the Hawaii Regional, and we are already making plans to return. I said "we" because my husband Chip, who doesn't play bridge, offered to accompany me to Hawaii. The host hotel is very comfortable, and conveniently located close to the Ala Moana shopping center. Waikiki has endless opportunities for shopping and restaurants, and if you don't want to walk back to the hotel, the city bus is only a dollar for seniors with a Medicare card. Chip has also volunteered to go to Sunriver with me, which should tell you something about the quality of that resort.

May is a perfect time for the Sunriver tournament because it is late enough for the mountain passes to be clear of snow and the weather to be sunny but not hot, while still out-of-season. If you haven't already made reservations, now is the time to find them. The resort has many condominiums and houses available — with living rooms and full kitchens! — as well as

the lodge rooms that are advertised in our tournament flyer. This is an ideal opportunity to bring your family — even if you are the only bridge player.

Much to do in Sunriver

The Sunriver resort includes championship golf courses, tennis, fishing, and untold miles of relatively level bike paths, in addition to six restaurants and a fully-stocked grocery store. Also included (for resort guests) is use of the fitness center, and a \$25 discount on spa treatments. Besides all this, there is an airstrip that will accommodate most private planes, including jets. Mount Bachelor is close to Sunriver, and offers mountain biking and hiking, with skiing a possibility in May, depending on snow levels.

The locals tell me that it is possible to confuse "Bend" with "North Bend," a town on the Oregon coast. So if you know anyone who is flying in from out of town, please confirm that they are headed to the Redmond airport — or to the Sunriver airstrip.

Thanks to everyone who supported the Oregon Trail Regional, and especially to Marie Ashton for running a great tournament that seemed more like a party at times. Margi Redden, our wonderful I/N coordinator, spent most of the week playing with newer players — including one partner who had played bridge less than a month, and who earned his first red points with her. Another highlight was attending the annual Thursday night Thai no-host dinner that Mary Alice Seville organizes for all the Corvallis club members — from the familiar faces to the newbies.

That's all until we meet again — hopefully in Sunriver in May.





The Bidding Toolbox

Roman Jumps: An alternative two-suited overcall that specifies both suits

Most players use **Unusual NoTrump** or a version of **Michaels** to overcall with a two-suited hand. In this column, we'll examine an alternative two-suited overcall called **Roman Jumps**.

But first, a review of the more popular methods.

Both Unusual NT and Michaels allow a partnership to achieve a contract through

length, not strength. Use of the convention also helps prevent the opponents from finding a fit because of the consumed bidding space.

UNT usually describes a hand with the two lower unbid suits.

For example, if the opening bid is 1♥ or 1♠, then a jump to 2NT shows the minors.

And if the opening bid is 1♣ (natural) or 1♦, 2NT shows the lower two of the three unbid suits.

A Michaels bid (cuebidding the opener's suit) also shows a two-suiter. Typically, if the opening bid is 1 of a minor, cuebidding that minor shows the majors; and if the opening bid is 1 of a major, cuebidding that major shows the other major and an unnamed minor. If advancer can't support the other major, she bids 2NT, asking overcaller to name his minor.

With either Unusual NT or Michaels, the overcaller usually shows 5-11 points with favorable vulnerability and slightly higher and stronger in honors at unfavorable vulnerability. With a full opening strength, the overcaller can bid his suits separately.

Still others prefer a mini-maxi approach, using the conventions with either 5-11 HCP or 16+. With the middle range, 12-15, the overcaller bids the suits separately.

There are other, modified versions of Michaels out there, but let's not digress. (*Email me if you want to know.*)

What does advancer do after partner uses Unusual No Trump or Michaels? With 0-9 points, advancer bids minimally. With 10 or more, advancer jumps in a known fit, inviting game.

When there is no known fit (partner overcalls 1♥ with a Michaels 2♥, showing spades and a minor, and advancer does not have a spade fit), advancer must proceed more cautiously. If the advancer asks for the minor suit (2NT), and discovers an excellent fit, advancer can press forward with extra values, taking vulnerability into consideration.

Roman Jumps

Roman Jump Overcalls is another way of showing a two-suited hand over 1-level opening bids. When they're used, the single jump shows the suit bid and the next higher ranking unbid suit. For example, if the opening bid is 1♦, then:

- ▶ 2♥ shows hearts and spades.
- ▶ 2♠ shows spades and clubs.
- ▶ 3♣ shows clubs and hearts.

The various iterations of Unusual No Trump and Michaels give most partnerships enough options to show a two-suited hand over an opening 1-bid. So Roman Jumps is rarely used at that level.

However, Roman Jumps can be a very useful tool when the opponents open a weak two bid.

How many times have you held a good

balanced hand when your RHO opened a weak two and thought you could make 3NT if partner had the weak two suit stopped? Do you make a direct cuebid (Western Cue) to ask if partner has the opener's suit stopped?

Then there are the times you hold a good two-suit hand when RHO opens a weak two. Do you make a direct cuebid as a Michaels two-suit overcall?

There's the rub. A direct cuebid can't have two meanings. It can't be a Western Cue bid as well as a Michaels bid.

This is where Roman Jumps comes in. If you play Roman Jumps over weak two bids, a direct cuebid always is **Western Cue**.

It says, "Partner, if you have the opener's suit stopped, bid 3NT." Typically you'd have

balanced values with perhaps a very good 5-card minor. With unbalanced hands you can either double or bid your suit, depending on your strength or distribution.

Thus, since the direct cuebid at the 3-level is always Western Cue, you need another tool for a two-suited hand. Roman Jumps fits the bill perfectly. Some prefer it to **Leaping Michaels**, because you can get out at the 3-level over an opening 2♦ bid if you have the majors.

- So, if the opening bid is 2♦, then:
- ▶ 3♥ is hearts and spades (the suit bid and the next higher unbid suit).
 - ▶ 3♠ is spades and clubs.
 - ▶ 4♣ is clubs and hearts.

Similarly, if the opening bid is 2♥, then:

- ♦ 3♠ is spades and clubs.
- ♦ 4♣ is clubs and diamonds.
- ♦ 4♦ is diamonds and spades.

Roman Jumps is easy to remember and gives you a two-suit tool, reserving the direct cuebid for 3NT aspirations.

As with Leaping Michaels, Roman Jumps is used only when you can afford to be at the 3- or 4-level. And it's always a single jump.

If partner is an unpassed hand, you can assume 6-8 points from partner's hand to combine with yours in determining your course of action.

If partner is a passed hand and you have a minimum opening bid (12-15) with two suits, it might be more prudent to bid one suit and then the other if the opportunity arises.

Note: You can use Western Cue and Roman Jumps in the balancing seat as well, after LHO opens a weak 2 followed by two passes.

Coming next: Defensive strategies over two-suit overcalls after your partner opens 1 of a suit or 1NT.

Building a Better Bridge Player

Defense against Precision:
The 1♣ opening bid

Last time out we talked about the weakest bid in Precision, the 1♦ bid. This time we are going to focus on the 1♣ bid. If you remember, Precision players open all big hands 1♣. This includes hands you would normally open 2♣ with, as well as some of the

stronger hands you would open at the 1-level with. Generally 1♣ promises 16+ HCP, but some pairs play it weaker, and some stronger. Because the 1♣ bid shows such a big hand, it is less important to have constructive over-calls. By this, I mean that you will usually not be in game after they have opened 1♣ unless there is some wild distribution going around. With finding game a lesser priority, you can focus your efforts on something kind of fun: Messing up the opponent's bidding. There are a whole bunch of conventions out there meant to disrupt a Precision Club auction. One of the oldest conventions out there is Mathe,

where you use double to show a hand with both majors, and 1NT to show a hand with both minors, all other bids being natural. Personally, I don't have a strong preference what I play, other than it has to allow us to raise the level of the auction quickly, before they can start getting their bids in cheaply.

The weaknesses of a Precision Club are that it is easy to enter the auction at fairly low levels, and that the Precision Club opener (and sometimes responder) doesn't start naming suits until the second round of the auction. This makes the bidding very vulnerable to preemption, especially at favorable vulnerability.

My recommendation for defending the Precision 1♣ opener is the same as my recommendation for defending against a Precision 1♦ opener: If you have a close decision as to whether or not to get in their auction, then always decide to get into their auction.

This is true even at the 1-level; just because you cannot jump to the 3-level eating up all of their room does not mean that partner can't in response.

what makes them rise above the rest.

Sandra Baker

Sandra Baker learned bridge about 15 years ago, has been playing duplicate bridge for about 13 years, and is a Life Master. Among her many accomplishments, Baker is known for bringing new players into the game. Baker and friend Ann Gramson (both qualified ACBL accredited teachers) run beginning courses and duplicate games from Gramson's home in Seaside. Sue Kroning says Baker's efforts to bring in new players have increased attendance and unit numbers by 10 percent. And it seems teaching is the perfect role for Baker.

Urgana also followed in Bonawitz's footsteps, teaching the Audrey Grant series to beginner students. "She truly embodies the spirit of the ACBL, spreading the game we love to anyone who will sit still!" said Bonawitz.

Sylvia Riewerts

Many people know Sylvia Riewerts as a frequent partner of Sam Asai, but her Goodwill Ambassador nomination proves she has made a name for herself in the bridge community. Among Riewerts' accomplishments is something that has been seen by everyone who has played at a District 20 regional in the past year, but hardly anyone knows she's responsible for it.

Riewerts built the Winners' Circle, a backdrop that has been used at all district regionals since its construction. It's basically a prime photo-opp spot for winners to have their picture taken.

Being handy with a handsaw and PVC pipe is just one of her qualifications.

"She helps (I/N Coordinator) Margi (Redden), and she helps new players at our club (in Eureka)," said Larry Crumb.

After years of splitting her time between Portland and Eureka, Riewerts recently moved full-time to Portland. But though she isn't in Eureka as often, she still relishes the chance to help the newer players



there. "Nobody else will help them," she said, "because they all like to win!"

Sue Carle

What has kept Sue Carle in the game of bridge for the last 40 years? Above all else, the people. Or as Sue calls them her "bridge family." "We are an interesting group of individuals," she said. She got into the game when a Longview WA neighbor randomly stopped by and asked her if she played bridge. The two made a bridge date, had fun, and the rest is history!

Beyond the people, Sue enjoys the competition. "In what other activity can a regular guy or gal get to play against the very best players in the game?" she asks. Then, there's the surprise of each new hand. Finally, Sue enjoys good defense. "It's very satisfying to work with a partner to defeat a tough contract," she said.

But it takes more than a love for the game to earn a Goodwill Ambassador nomination. Sue's husband, Rich, says she earned this honor based on the way she approaches the game. "Sue is very easy and available to play with. She always greets everyone with a smile," Rich said. "She is genuinely interested in people's lives away from the table."

Rich also muses on Sue's desire to "remind folks of proper behavior." He says Sue is a believer in the 'zero tolerance policy,' working hard behind-the-scenes to make bridge the best it can be.

Sue's advice to veteran bridge players is to "enjoy the challenges and new friends. Don't whine when you come up against good players. Think of it as an opportunity!"

Her best advice, though, applies to players new and old alike: "Be a good partner."

Three race to top 5 in Mini-McKenney

Three District 20 players finished in the top 5 of national Mini-McKenney races. **Mark Rowe** of Philomath OR fell just short of winning the 5-20 bracket, finishing just 2.13 points behind Kyle Olson of Mustang OK.

Ian Milligan of Corvallis finished fourth in the 50-100 bracket, and **Roger McNay** was fifth in 5000-7500.

All winners of District 20 races for both the Mini-McKenney and Helen Shanbrom Ace of Clubs are pictured on page 3.

As of Jan. 6, Rowe, who earned 339.23 points in 2013, led his race by 2.44. He knew Olson had another 2.07 in then-unreported points coming, but expected to hang on by 0.37. But somewhere along the way Olson picked up another 2.5 to pull the surprise win.

Milligan's 2013 total was 229.78. McNay, at 1,074.81, was one of three district players to score more than a thousand, along with fellow pros Huub Bertens and Jeff Roman.

Six other district players placed in the top 25 of their national races: Stan Blascow, 10th (50-100); Dan Hoekstra, 11th (2500-5000); Eileen Milligan, 17th (200-300); Larry Henderson, 18th (20-50); Huub Bertens, 20th (10,000+); and Don Robinson, 25th (100-200). Hoekstra had been eighth as of Jan. 6 but dropped three spots in the final tally.

In national Ace of Clubs races, four district players finished in the top 10, led by Rowe, who was third: Bill Jones, 5th (100-200); Rick Gardener, 6th (20-50); and Blascow, 8th.


Congratulations to **Michel Leduc** on the birth of his granddaughter. We hope he is enjoying the new addition.


Brookings begins series of newcomer classes

Visiting from Utah are **Ray and Rose Herberer**. They will be with us for three months — welcome and enjoy your visit





The La Paz bridge club, unsanctioned still, plays twice a week, with five ACBL snowbirds. Last week the La Paz group and three from Todos Santos played for several hours to benefit a charity that is training something close to paramedics, much needed due to the small and remote communities with no access to ambulance or EMTs. We donated over \$110. In my 30-plus years here, I have never run into a Mexican bridge player, but players from at least five countries.

Todos Santos was a very very small town, originally a fishing village on the Pacific Ocean side, and within 50 miles of the Sea of

Cortez. Getting to Todos Santos now could look somewhat like driving on a U.S. highway, four lanes in most places, except for some strange symbols on signs, including large rocks in the road to indicate a warning with any of many possibilities. A few clear indicators that you are not in the U.S.: some skinny cows wander into the road, often with a con-

tingency of cows resembling an anemic herd; an occasional fox or coyote. And the greatest part of the drive is the lack of police that stop you. They aren't set up to stop as much as U.S. police, or kids in back of trucks and strange truckloads.

In more than 35 years of visiting here, I have never seen any indication of the cartels or drugs

that exist elsewhere in Mexico. The organic markets provide an excellent lifestyle here: Daily fresh fish for less than a fifth of U.S. prices, avocados for about 25 cents and amazing variety.



The unit board decided to rectify that when it accepted a proposal by Trumpet columnist **Jim Flint** to write profiles of other members to add to the list.



Dear John,

West believed 4NT was quantitative. Is that a good assumption? If yes, then how does East ask for aces? What is the best way to bid these hands playing 2/1?

— Missed yet another slam

Dear Timid,

In the early days of bridge, 4NT was “always Blackwood.” Bidding theory evolved to the point where 4NT over a narrowly defined NT bid (opening 1NT = 15-17, opening 2NT = 20-21, 2NT rebid after a one-level response = 18-19) simply asked partner to go to slam if at the top of his range. This is called a quantitative raise. Opener is allowed to introduce an unknown four- or five-card suit in an effort to identify a fit that may produce a needed extra trick.

My personal belief is that if one member of the partnership has bid 3NT, denying a fit and, in his mind, ending the auction, a raise to 4NT is also quantitative. This approach is particularly useful in 2-over-1 auctions where jumps to show extra strength are unnecessary. Each partner may have an above-average hand with no opportunity to express that power to partner.

I am curious as to what your East was hoping to find out through Blackwood. With 21 prime HCP, the time for 4NT was after 2♠. If partner showed two key cards with the ♠Q, a subsequent 5NT, confirming possession of all the key cards, should elicit 7NT with a long spade suit that is running opposite a small singleton (seven cards long headed by the ♠AKQ or six including the jack) and any other useful card.

Dear John,

You’ve landed in an aggressive 6♠. You survive the first hurdle when the hearts break 3-3 and you’re able to pitch your second diamond loser, reducing your hand to seven trumps without having messed up transportation. Despite your failure to will dummy’s singleton to morph into the ♠J, it seems there’s still a chance you might actually make this if you can bring home the spade suit for one loser. Your only other distributional information is that RHO started with queen-doubleton clubs. What’s the best play for 12 tricks?

Dear Four to a Royal,

By far, the best play for 12 tricks is a spade to the queen. It appears that you received a diamond lead and started to quickly pitch your losers. It would have been better to immediately take the trump finesse because playing hearts early might have given the defense an extra chance to develop a second trump trick. Imagine either defender with both a doubleton heart and a doubleton trump.

You must have had an interesting auction to arrive in 6♠ with this misfitting combination of 27 HCP. Often, just taking 12 tricks on a hand like this will earn an above-average score.
