

Taylor wins Super Senior Pairs

Jeff Taylor won the Super Senior Pairs playing with former ACBL president Craig Robinson at the Fall NABC in Providence.

Although the event has no masterpoint limit, it is restricted to players over 70, so it doesn't qualify toward making Taylor, who passed 10,000 points last January, a Grand Life Master.

The former district president

was, however, still celebrating the big win four weeks later during the Reno Holiday Regional.

The event consisted of a twosession qualifying round Nov. 30 followed by a two-session final Dec. 1. Taylor and Robinson were second after the first day and finished with a 61.5% in the last session to win by two boards. See page 8 for a deal from the event.

Among other D20 results: Dan Neill was 1B/2-3A in V & A Loring Stratified Open Pairs. Jake Olsen and Dawn Campbell were 1C/3B in the same event.

Neill also with Meg Myers and Dave Brower placed 20th in the 0-10,000 Swiss. Brower was 27th in the 0-5,000 Blue Ribbon Pairs.

Suzanne St. Thomas, Irva Kay Neyhart and Brian Breckenridge won the Tuesday-Wednesday KO Bracket 2. Campbell and Elinor **Hood** won Bracket 3 of that event.

District 20's top masterpoint winner in Providence was John Lusky, who reached the quarterfinal of the Baze Senior KO and placed 21st in the North American Swiss on teams with Barry Rigal. Huub Bertens and his team placed 16th in the latter event.

I'm dreaming of a Portland national

The trip to the fall nationals in Providence, Rhode Island, was very interesting. Providence is not an easy place to get to from Portland. Most people traveling from the western part of the U.S. had to make at least one stop, with most of us making two.

The host hotel, the Omni, was connected via a walkway to the Convention Center and also to a large indoor mall where many good and relatively inexpensive

Providence is considered a "second tier"



My super sweet 16

The year before I became Trumpet editor, I went to eight tournaments. In 2013, my first year on the job, it was 12. Then last year I made it to 16.

This is another pattern that needs to be broken. Just as I successfully avoided repeating my previous pattern of doubling the number of masterpoints I earn from one year to the next by NOT gaining 400 points this year, it is among my goals for 2015 to attend *less* than 20 tournaments.

It is, of course, perfectly fine for a retired person or one who works within the bridge world to go to 20 tournaments in a year. In fact, if you're able to do so, please do go to 20 — trust me, you'll love it!

But it is resolutely not OK for someone who works full time outside of bridge to attempt this.

When it comes to limiting my bridge to something my body can be reasonably expected to withstand, my only two problems are a general inability to turn down invitations — they are forcing, right? — and an apparently exceptional skill at finding time I don't really have. How else did I convert my 15 total vacation/personal/sick days into 45 playing days at 16 tournaments? Sheer wizardry, I tell you.

By the way, I should point out that among my five regionals, nine sectionals, one national and one online qualifier for a national event in 2014, all of these except the national took place in District 20. I'd actually like to get out to some other places someday, but that isn't currently possible without giving up some of the D20 tournaments that consume *all* of my vacation time, as they surely will in 2015.

In addition to all these tournaments, I also started playing online last year. I hadn't done that before the GNT, and while I intended to get some practice before, the district final turned out to be my first time. Afterward, however, since I'd created a BBO account, I decided to use it.

For a long time I'd been reluctant to venture out into playing with strangers online because I was afraid of the quality I'd find. Now, having done so, I can report that it's far worse than I ever imagined. But that doesn't really bother me as much as I expected — as long as it's just something to do during lunch at work and it's free. But it's better if I can spend the vast majority of the time defending.

My co-workers do occasionally hear me berating my phone, which can only mean I am dummy and forced to watch a particularly horrific line of play. (But I only yell at the screen because they can't hear me; *not a word* goes into the chat window.) Declaring isn't much better, since that usually means someone has put me in a terrible contract.

Like this hand I played on Christmas Eve with a partner from China who admits to being a beginner.

♦975 **♥**KQ **♦**A976 **♣**AQ104

1♥ is opened on my right, and I overcall a lousy 1NT. This is passed around to RHO, who now bids 2♣.

There's nothing I'd rather defend with this hand than a club contract, so I pass. It looks like things are going well when — please no! — partner balances to 2NT. The 18-point hand is merciful not to double. Dummy comes down with a truly miserable 3 points when the ♥8 is led.

♠Q62 ♥10752 ♦1083 ♣J82
If bad bids were against the law in China, I'd hate to think what might happen to my partner if her government found out about this.

The lady from Texas on my right takes her \checkmark A (squashing my \checkmark K) and leads back, of all the things, the \checkmark J to my known stiff \checkmark Q. I need an entry to the board to finesse clubs, and since I can't get to the \checkmark 10, I lead my \checkmark 6 and let it ride. The Texan wins her \checkmark Q (ostensibly denying the \checkmark J?) and shifts to the \clubsuit 3 — \clubsuit 4, \clubsuit 5, to dummy's \clubsuit 8.

Having been granted my entry, I continue with the ♣J, which holds, and the ♣2 to my ♣Q, followed by the ♣A, which drops the ♣K. Since I still can't get to the hearts, I lead another diamond toward the now-stiff ◆10. LHO goes up with the ◆K, crashing the ◆J his partner lied about not having.

LHO now leads a low spade, the suit I've been dreading. Even though RHO's ♠AK tight means I had a stopper all along, I don't know that yet, and I certainly won't risk finding out if she sticks me on the board with a heart.

But RHO helpfully cashes both spades, giving me the rest of the tricks when she leads from ♥963 into dummy's ♠Q ♥107. Meaning I've made 2NT — a miracle that in no way excuses the bidding.

Oops, I hoped to tell you about a terrific 22-point slam my partner bid and made in Reno, but I'm out of space, so maybe later.

We were young then. Bridge was fun. "Bridge is real. Bridge is earnest. And so is life."



ies. It turns out that he'd frozen the cookies to prolong his enjoyment. I got a great laugh over picturing him eating Christmas cookies from a Santa Claus tin while he played bridge into the wee hours of the morning, many months after the holiday. Doug always relished joy when he found it, no matter how small (or how stale!).

To me, Doug was so much more than a great bridge partner. He was my confidant, my mentor, my best friend, my family. Anytime I picked up the phone to dial his number, he was at the other end ready to listen. Doug always had my back, and I could do no wrong in his eyes. He loved me, was a great ally, and treated me like a son. For 15 years, we shared our lives together — good and bad — regardless of how close we were geographically. It's this friendship that I'll miss the most.

After Doug passed, many have e-mailed me with their own stories and memories with Doug. The footprint he left in our lives, bridge clubs and community was indelible and won't be forgotten. Words really can't describe what a great friend Doug was, how important he was to his friends and family, what an inspiration he was during times of struggle, or how much he'll be missed.

the Trumpet. I recommend it to everyone in our district. She wrote about her experience playing in this year's NAP (North American Pairs). In her article she mentions many of the issues that our North American Events Committee has been grappling with over the years.

Before we started hosting the event online, Sue and others had to drive to a different city, often Portland, to play. She wrote that she didn't have much fun and they never did it again. This year she was inspired to play in the event now that she didn't have to travel away from her local area. I hope that many others are inspired to try out our new format. It would be wonderful for our members throughout our district, from Boise to Guam, from Kona to Redding, to join in and play.

Sue also wrote about one of the problems with online play. Many players are not used to playing online. There is a learning curve that Sue and her group tackled in advance. They got together and practiced. They played some relaxed bridge before they jumped into the main event. I am sure this informal bridge is not much different than most of our first experiences with bridge. Most of us played kitchen or dorm bridge when we were starting out. We didn't start out as the experienced players we are today.

Sue wrote about some problems with our online event that I hope to be able to solve. Just as our players are new to online play our administrators and directors are also new. We have only had two years of online play. We need to develop educational materials and procedural handouts so everyone will know what to expect and can minimize their mechanical errors.

These are my favorite events of the year. You get to play in a national championship event without leaving your local area. You can play in one of the flights with players of your own skill level and if you do well, you receive a substantial subsidy to go play at the next level.

I urge anyone to write to me with problems you have experienced in our events. Be sure to include some helpful suggestions. I also hope many people will write to me about their positive experiences in these wonderful events; events that have been made more accessible by our online format

I can only remember ever playing once after that until preseason college football. Four freshmen and a sophomore, all linemen, started playing to ease the pain of thrice a day practices. The sophomore was soon replaced by another freshman who became my partner. Our foursome played a lot of dorm bridge and ate a lot of pizza.

I remember my first duplicate. An upperclassman back from Vietnam had a car and took us to play in the Friday night game at Freeman and Suzanne Mason"s house. During the ride he taught us Pinpoint Astro and Flannery. He told us these were essential if we were going to have any chance. Armed with these two essentials and Stayman and Blackwood we played.

Of interest was the fact that this club game held in the basement of a family home in the fall of 1970 was scored by computer. All four of those in that car still play duplicate bridge.

How long have you been on the North American Events Committee? Why that?

I wanted to be of some service to bridge in our area. I have had some success in the North American events and thought I could help. I served in Rich Carle's committee the last three years and agreed to become the coordinator now that Rich is stepping down. Rich spearheaded the change to online play. I think we all owe him our thanks for the work he has done. I think that with a district as spread out as ours, online play is the most practical

way to hold our contests.

What are your plans as coordinator?

My challenge as the new coordinator is to address the issues with online play and through outreach and education expand our districts participation. The flexibility of online play provides everyone a chance to play without having to travel hundreds or thousands of miles. We now have more brackets for people to play in and far larger subsidies for our winners. Changes to our formats will increase the number of masterpoints available for some of our brackets. I plan to develop ACBL point-paying practice events that will help overcome player's anxiety over the online format.

What do you do/enjoy outside of bridge?

Our family has been the focus of our lives away from bridge. However, now that our own children are grown and have moved on with their lives, Kate and I have become foster parents for the Oregon Youth Authority. Our foster children sometimes accompany us to bridge tournaments and have even started to work as caddies.

They often accompany us on our hikes throughout the Northwest. We have been to the Olympic peninsula, Mount St. Helens, throughout the Colombia River Gorge, Saddle Mountain and Seaside, Silver Falls and Forest Park. We hope to go on the Pacific Coast Trail this summer.

The Bidding Toolbox

Taking the mystery out of responsive doubles

Most duplicate bridge players are familiar with takeout and negative doubles. 1♠, double implies four hearts and tolerance for clubs and diamonds. 1♥, double implies four spades and tolerance for the other two suits. One minor, double implies support for the other three suits.

And many of us use support doubles and redoubles, showing three-card support for responder's suit after we open the

bidding, when RHO bids over or doubles responder's call.

Example: 1♣, pass, 1♥, 1♠, double, showing three hearts support. Or: 1♣, pass, 1♠, double, redouble, showing three spades for partner.

When opener sup-Jim Flint ports responder's suit The Bidding Toolbox instead of doubling or redoubling RHO, re-

sponder knows his partner has support of four or more, since he would have used the support double or redouble to show exactly three.

But how many of us check the little box on the convention card next to "Responsive Doubles"?

Regular partnerships who learn how to use responsive doubles add a very useful gadget to their bidding toolbox.

In a nutshell, responsive doubles can be used following an opening bid by the opponents, a bid or takeout double by your partner, and a two- or three-level raise by the opener's partner. You as advancer can double to communicate important information about your hand.

It is used only when the responder has supported opener with a raise. And these parameters are part of the system:

You, as responsive doubler, have 8 to 11 scattered points (including distribution).

If the opening is a major, the responsive double shows better distribution in the minor suits, otherwise it would be smarter to support partner's implied major.

If the opening is a minor suit, the responsive double shows the majors. You're asking partner, who made a takeout double, to choose his better major.

Here's an example:

North East South West 1♣ Double 2♣ Double

West, with:

♠Qxxx **♥**QJxx

♦ Qxxx ♣x

makes a responsive double to show both majors, asking partner to pick a major. If partner has made a takeout double with diamonds and a strong hand, he'll let you know with his next bid.

West is too weak to cuebid the clubs, so he shows his holding rather than guess which suit his partner would prefer.

When the bidding goes like this:

North East South West 1♠ Double 2♠ Double

West, with 8-11 points and, say, 3=2=4=4, shows his two minor suits with his responsive double. East must now bid a minor. Or he can pass if North makes a bid. Or he can bid his suit if he doubled with a strong one-suiter.

Sometimes your partner may overcall instead of making a takeout double. You can still use the responsive double if responder raises opener's suit. Example:

> North East South West 2♥ Double

Your responsive double as West shows the unbid suits. Not only are your values important, but so is your distribution and losing trick count. You may hold, in this case, three hearts and know that partner is short in that suit.

When is a double in fourth seat not a responsive double?

- When partner has overcalled 1NT, the double in fourth seat is penalty.
- When partner has doubled a preemptive (weak two) opener, the double in fourth seat is not responsive.
- If partner has made a strong jump overcall in second seat, the double in fourth seat is not responsive.
- And when third seat bids a *new* suit. the double by fourth seat becomes optional.

When should you simply cuebid the opponents' suit instead of making a responsive double? When your holding is stronger by virtue of your distribution. For example:

> North East South West 1♣ Double 2♣ 3♣

West's cue bid shows distributional strength with a hand such as:

♠QJ10xxx

♥QJ10xxx

Your partner should consider a game in a major suit. And when partner picks the suit, the lead comes up to him through the stronger opponent's (opener's) hand.

If you decide to add responsive doubles to your toolbox, make sure you and your partner have a firm agreement about the meanings and applications of the tool.







"What we found is that our values are almost identical, but our way of being in the world has many contrasts," Al said. "We are a perfect example of a left-brain/right-brain, Mars-and-Venus, analytic-and-artistic couple. Our skills complement each other's."

Or, as Gen put it, "Al speaks French. Now what lady wouldn't love that?"

In addition to seeing the world differently, they were on slightly different playing fields in the world of bridge. When Al and Gen met, he had more than 3,500 masterpoints and she had just 5. She was just learning the game, and he was teaching others.

You might think teaching bridge to someone you love would be challenging. And you would be right. But Al found teaching Gen the game actually made him a better teacher. "I was forced to reflect on what she wasn't perceiving and why," he said.

Gen decided to get into the game because of Al's passion for it. "I've always loved cards, but he loves bridge so much, I jumped in," she explained. So, how has the experience been for her? She describes it as "interesting, rewarding, and sometimes shocking. The depth of the game is overwhelming."

Despite a rough first exchange and intense bridge lessons, Al and Gen found love. Six weeks after the two had met, Al got a six-week assignment as a bridge in-

"Everyone's role in this made the celebration even more meaningful," Al reflects. "It is a memory that each of us will treasure forever."



Winning Super Senior Pairs

This deal, originally reported by Philip Alder in the New York Times, is from Jeff Taylor and Craig Robinson's win in the Super Senior Pairs in Providence.

Both vulnerable



Taylor passed initially, despite having 11 points and 9 cards in the majors for a dubious rule of 20.

"Even though my hand sort of qualifies for a rule of 20, I downgraded it because of the two queen-x holdings," Taylor said. "I want most of my points in the two long suits for a rule of 20 opening."

Robinson opened 1♠ in third seat and Taylor responded 1♠. Robinson, with two honors among his three-card spade support and a singleton heart, raised to 2♠, and Taylor bid game.

A low diamond was led and Taylor ducked in dummy. When his queen won, he finessed another diamond to the jack and led a low club. East grabbed his ace and returned a heart.

Taylor now cashed his top two hearts and the $\clubsuit Q$, then ruffed a heart on the board. He led the $\spadesuit A$, which was ruffed and overruffed by Taylor. Taylor ruffed his fourth heart with the $\clubsuit J$ and exited with the $\spadesuit K$. When the stiff $\spadesuit Q$ fell under it, Taylor was able to claim making five for a near top.

If Portland builds a convention hotel, I'm sure the ACBL will strongly consider Portland to host an NABC. I think it's about time — the last time we hosted an NABC was 1986. Once they break ground for the new hotel we can start making plans for another mainland D20 nationals.

ACBLscore+

The biggest issue for the league is the new rewrite of Acblscor+. The contract to write a new scoring program called Acblscor+ did not produce what was expected; after the program was reviewed by ACBL, several tech-savvy board members and several outside consultants, it was determined that the program would not provide what was needed and the committee determined the best direction for the ACBL was to abandon this program and terminate the contract (a \$1.5 million project).

As you might expect, many questions were received and the answers provided did not seem to satisfy many of the ACBL members.

Moving forward, ACBL CEO Robert
Hartman decided to form a committee to
provide oversight to the Asblscore improvement program (now being undertaken by ACBL staff) and provide review
and oversight of ACBL technology in general. The committee is made up of two
members of the ACBL staff, one outside
consultant hired by the ACBL, three ACBL
board members — who have technology

backgrounds — and three at-large ACBL members who have exceptional technology backgrounds. This committee will act as an advisory panel as we move forward.

I have been selected to sit on this committee along with Jay Whipple from District 9 (Florida) and Russ Jones from District 10. Both Jay and Russ have extensive experience in technology and should be tremendous help as we move forward. This committee will be meeting many times over the next year and help ACBL do the best it can in the tech arena.

This issue has become such a hot button that it's taking up more and more of my time. I wish the membership had a better understanding of what went on with the failed rewrite; we've released as much information as possible without going into confidential agreements signed at the time the contract was terminated. I can tell you from 40 years of computer programing that I am 100% in agreement that the ACBL did the right thing in moving forward in this new direction.

One of the new items used at the fall NABC was ACBL Live results reporting. The process was easy — you went online to sign up for the service and then shortly after the game you would receive an email and or text with a link to your results for the session and the individual matchpoints, scores normally shown on the recaps hung in the room.

This feature worked great but unfortunately finding results of your friends, overall leaders, qualifiers etc., was

disappointing to say the least. I heard many complaints from many players that team games, KO and other results were not reported. Obviously this part of the program needs lots of work and hopefully most of the kinks will be worked out in time to be more efficient by New Orleans in March.

The ACBL is also working on a partnership website which was used in Providence. I did not use it and have not had much feedback from this. It will be available for use by all districts in 2015. I think later in the year it should be available for clubs.

Learn to Play Bridge Launch

Preliminary discussions are underway with Education Department about timing and needs to launch Learn to Play Bridge. The communications plan for a soft launch to clubs and teachers is now ready for implementation. The full internal and external launch with marketing support is planned for later this year.

Other news

- ◆ Suzi Subeck from Chicago was elected president of the ACBL for 2015. She's a ball of fire and will make a very fine president.
- ◆ The main item from the board meetings was the revision of the masterpoints awarded for pair games at sectionals and regionals. The increases in masterpoints awarded should bring them more in line with points offered for team games.
 - Howard Weinstein and Georgia Heth

were elected to serve as ACBL representatives to the World Bridge Federation. Howard is the president of the United States Bridge Federation. Georgia is a member of the ACBL board and has worked with the WBF for nine years. Georgia was also the appeals chair that heard and ruled on the infamous cheating scandal involving the German doctors.

• Membership in the ACBL seems to be holding at the same level it has for the past few years. Tournaments have declined a small percentage. The league is in good financial condition.

Further details of the Providence meetings can be found at ACBL.org. I am happy to answer any and all questions about the ACBL; I might not have all the answers but I can certainly try to find answers for you.

On Jan. 4 I was to be in Horn Lake to work for several days with the newly formed Technology Committee; I'll update you in the next Trumpet.

Lastly a big atta-boy to **Jeff Taylor** and former ACBL president (and a good friend) Craig Robinson for winning the Super Senior NABC event in Providence!

Kaessner: Wild club game generates a slew of interesting hands

Interestingly, one North-South pair that reached 4♠ only made five. How about this for killing defense! After taking the opening ♥A lead, West underleads the ♣K with his ♣3. Declarer can't afford to let East take the trick (which would likely give West a ruff), so he plays dummy's ♣A; later losing the ♣K and only making five. (I'm going to try to incorporate that sneaky defensive action into my own arsenal.)

On to the next round.

This time I'm in second seat, all vul. Dealer passes and I examine:

♦K106 **♥**K876 **♦**A1052 **♣**J6

I only recently heard an unsubstantiated statement that Barry Crane advocated opening all 11-point hands. OK, what the heck, let's start the auction with 1♦. LHO passes. I always cringe when that happens because partner likely has a pretty good hand and might expect more from me.


Partner bids 1♠, followed by RHO's pass. Sometimes in this situation I raise partner's major with 3-card support; but I decided to just bid 1NT since I like to use that bid to emphasize my desire to keep us at the lowest possible level.

Partner then bids 2♣ and I'm still trying to keep the contract reasonable, so I just suggest signing off at 2NT. Partner raises to 3NT — so I'm optimistic I'll see at least a full opener in the dummy.

The opening lead of the ♥3 is faced and dummy gives me:

♦AJ98 ♥109 ♦86 **♣**A9752

Well! This is hopeless! I'll just do the best I can. Looks like I ought to get two heart tricks (because of the opening lead), three spades (maybe four), and the two outside aces. I'm going to need some good fortune to avoid minus 200. Here's the whole deal:



West clearly has a challenge with the opening lead. Underleading a bare queen is often wrong, so why not try to find partner with at least a four-card heart suit. I play the ♥9 covered by the ♥J to my ♥K at trick one. At least I now have the fortunate spots to ensure scoring another heart trick.

I try a small spade to the ♠9 and it holds — another apparent spot of good luck. Now I have to exit dummy and a small club seems to be a reasonable choice. The ♣K pops up on my right and I escape sacrificing any bigger spots in my club suit. RHO dutifully returns the ♥J to his partner who now is caught in a dilemma as to whether or not to overtake while smothering dummy's ♥10.

LHO ponders and then he does overtake and returns his last heart to my ♥87. Did I just get three heart tricks out of this mess?

Now I can score my ♠K, and then when the ♠Q covers my ♠10, I score two more spades in the dummy. Three heart tricks and four spade tricks with two aces left means I've actually made my contract!

I can't recall how it happened, but subsequent squeezes resulted in one more trick for me at the end and I made four!

The traveler revealed some less-exciting results. This hand was passed out four times (out of eight tables)! It was played in lower levels of notrump by both sides, and each time the notrump contract was set.

Looks like a day when fortune is smiling. Our +630 stands out like a scoring error!

So things have been going well and we enter the final round. Here I am the dealer again, all nonvul, and I pick up:

♦4 **♥**K7543 **♦**Q **♣**AJ8742

Here we go again, another distributional hand with borderline values. If I don't open this, how will I ever get my message across? And I'll have to bid my 5-card heart suit first instead of the 6-card club suit.


So OK, I open 1♥, LHO passes (cringe) and partner bids 1♠. RHO passes and I'm already beginning to worry about things getting out of hand. I bid 2♣.

Now what do I hear from partner? — 4♦! We've now bypassed 3NT, so I just meekly call 5♣ and hope partner gets the message. Partner raises to 6♣ and tables:

♦A532 **♥**A9 **♦**A654 **♣**KQ3

What a partner!

The opening lead is the ♥6. A little false carding by the opponents scares me into ruffing the third round of hearts with my ♣K. As it turns out, the hearts split 3-3 and the clubs 1-3 and I make seven! The whole deal:



One other pair bid 6♣, but only made six. Another top that I might give credit to my "light" bidding style.

The final interesting hand of the session was next. This time I'm in fourth seat, vul:


♦5 ♥AK964 ♦A10 **♣**J10983

Another distributional, minimum opener. I couldn't quite confirm (after the fact) how the bidding went, but I end up in 4 !!

My best recollection is that there were three passes to me and I opened 1♥, followed by LHO's 3♠ and then 4♥ by partner. So much for a hand where the points must be very balanced! The opening lead is the ♠A and dummy is tabled:

♦Q93 **♥**J72 **♦**K62 **♣**A765

A combined 22 HCP; but promising distribution. Depends on how the defensive cards lie. The full deal:



I played for the doubleton ♥Q and a 2-2 split in clubs — making five. I was surprised when the traveler revealed that even one other pair achieved that result (a tie for top). Half of the field is letting East-West play a spade contract.

I never cease to be amazed by the incredible player-dealt hands that can occur even at the smallest club games. I always like to envision how my "great" result might stack up in a big tournament of 40+ tables and scored across three sections.



Players featured on unit website

Unit 484 is more than an organization headed by a board that has an affiliation with ACBL. It's also, and perhaps primarily, the people — the members who support bridge week in and week out with their attendance at club games.

That's why a couple of volunteers decided years ago to write profiles of members to post on the unit's website. The writers, husband and wife, compiled an archive over the years of nearly three dozen profiles of local bridge players. Then ill health intervened and they were unable to continue the project.

Flash forward to 2013 when the board accepted a proposal by another volunteer to restart the project, and new profiles began appearing on the website.

"It's a way of helping members get better acquainted with their fellow bridge players," said Jim Flint, coordinator of the project.

"I try to include information about how they became interested in bridge, how their games have changed over the years, anecdotes from club and tournament play, plus personal data about their education, careers, and families," he said.

When a profile is completed, the story and a photo of the featured member are posted on the home page of the unit website. Then when a new profile is submitted, the web manager moves the previous story to the archives, and features the new one on the home page.

When a profiled member dies, her story is moved to a "Tributes" archive, so that a record of the members is preserved, sometimes along with obituary information.

"Members enjoy reading about the players they meet at the bridge table," Flint said, "learning a great deal more about their bridge pals than the limited time of a round allows."

The stories and photos are designed to capture the character and personality of the profiled player, not just his approach to bridge.

"That's why I asked my last profiled member, **Robert Serrett**, to pose for a photo holding the Stop Card from the bidding box," Flint said.

"Serrett, a member of the unit for about five years, is known for his preference always to use the Stop Card for any jump bid, even an opening strong 2 clubs bid. He owns his own Stop Card in case one is missing from the box. He has been teased about it more than once. His willingness to pose with the card is an example of his friendly good humor."



Player makes ethical choice; class sees 4 tables



We had a great example of Active Ethics this last month at EBC. **Gayle Helfrich** calls me to the table and indicates that she has "doubled" her partner's bid. After the standard, "So you don't think your partner can make her bid?" comment, we sorted things out and made a ruling that ended up benefiting the non-offending E/W pair.

What was interesting is that the opponents, trying to be "nice guys," had initially told Gayle, "Oh don't worry about it. Just take your double back and bid whatever you want to." Gayle indicated that she thought they might have some options and that the right thing to do was to call and make sure they were protected. And indeed that turned out to be the case. They ended up with a better result than had I not been called to the table. Kudos to Gayle.

We should all strive to be actively ethical players all the time. Law 16 deals with "Authorized and Unauthorized Information" and is one with which all players should be well-versed. As a club owner and director, there is nothing more frustrating or irritating than to see players, especially experienced players, violate this rule. When you provide unauthorized information to your partner by "a remark, a question ... unmistakable hesitation, unwonted speed, special emphasis, tone, ges-

ture, movement or mannerism," you are not only creating a difficult situation for your partner, you are cheating. Laws 73 and 74 are also worth a look.

Dear John,

It's hard to imagine a hand partner could have opened on that won't deliver 13 tricks in at least one of the black suits. If this is true, though, then the vulnerable opponents have bid themselves to the five level with no tricks outside the heart suit. What do you do?

— One who has options

Dear Eeny,


Unless the opponents are lifetime disciples of Timothy Leary or newly graduated students from David Brower's bidding class, something very odd is going on here.

Because I think partner should double with two small hearts to discourage me from bidding more, I believe he has a void or singleton there. If that is true, he probably would have bid 5♠ with prime support (certainly four to the ace, maybe ace third). Therefore, I conclude that he has 10 or 11 cards in the minors with longer clubs.

Because most opponents play to avoid large negative numbers, they should have extra distribution on this deal. If I lead ace an another trump, their side might win seven total heart tricks and possibly a diamond for +800 for the good guys. I am going to hope that their extra distribution entitles them to a trick on defense. For example, five spades to the ♠10 or ♣J10 (♣J9) fourth could produce a trick.

My choice of 6♣ will probably be enough if partner has a minimum opener like: ♠A6 ♥J ♦KQ84 ♣J87642. If partner does, in fact, have spade support, he can correct to 6♠ or cuebid 6♥ on the way there with a heart void and a decent hand.

A wise man once told me not to bid a grand slam unless I can count 13 tricks. Even a normal opening hand from partner like **♠**A84 **♥**Q6 **♦**Q104 **♣**KJ1075 will not produce the required number.



Dear John,

How badly do you want partner to know about your fifth heart? The vulnerability seemed right (this is pairs) for a stretch to 3♥, but that seemed less right when 4♥ went down 3 on the bad breaks that tend to turn up when the opponents preempt. Partner's 14-count (with three small hearts) suggests it should be our hand, but as it turns out they can make $3 \spadesuit$.

One who doesn't

Dear Moe,

This hand is not worth 3♥ in the Wonderland Novice Pairs. That bid is 100% forcing, and this meager collection is an ace away from that threshold. Opponents who preempt often cause trouble, but it is rarely proper strategy to join with them in confusing partner further. Just make a negative double and later look for an opportunity to show your extra heart. For example, not many would argue with 3* if partner rebids either 2NT or 3♦.
