Big first national for Portland teen

Highlights from Washington DC Summer NABC

Among the highlights of the Summer NABC for District 20 was in the open flight of the Grand National Teams. After qualifying in one of the last four spots in the first-day Swiss, the team of Huub Bertens, Jeff Roman, Roger McNay and captain Eric Stoltz survived an eight-board playoff in the second round to earn a quarterfinal match against District 9, for whom Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell play. The Stoltz team then knocked out the team that has won each of the past five GNTs to reach the semifinal (see story, page 3).

Louis Beauchet and Dan Hoekstra placed third in the Freeman Mixed BAM, helping Louis to 137 masterpoints in DC (see story, page 8).

Ed Freeman placed ninth in Bruce LM-5000 Pairs. Kevin Marnell and Justin **Beck** reached the guarterfinals of the Micro-Spingold. Playing with Beauchet, Marnell also earned a section top on the first day of the Red Ribbon Pairs, eventually finishing 26th.

In the National Youth Swiss, Jake Olsen's team finished second.

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ACBL finances improve; tech work goes on

ACBLscore will remain in use for the near future. The new rates for club financials were programmed and now seem to be functioning well after a few kinks were worked out. The ACBL is creating a separate program to calculate masterpoints, which will make the

Then years passed before I had a personal computer or email, and I didn't have a cell phone until 2005. Now I don't even own a television set, but have an iPad, two Android tablets, two iPhones and a laptop!

The technology is here to stay, so we may as well find a way to make it work for us. I personally like ACBL Live, getting results quickly via an email or text or looking online. The other night in Boise I left

last session, even though my partner Molly Harris and I had two good games and were in the hunt to place in the overalls. Instead of fighting for space at

the pole in the middle of the room and squinting at the printout, I was able to hit the baked potato bar (no line!) and enjoy my late-night snack while checking my scores on my phone once they came in. Incredible!

I like the feature on the ACBL website where you can see your masterpoint holding and how you rank against others in your state, unit, district, age group, etc. On BBO you can find hands you have played and click through each card, torturing yourself with mistakes over and over again! Or watch the world's best players on vugraph. Make it work for you.

Age is truly a number. It would not be a stretch for me to say that Louis Beauchet is, at age 15, one of my more mature partners. Watching his success has been exciting. I love newcomers and relative voungsters Mike Goffe and Michael Pham and the enthusiasm they bring to the game. And I admire those who are just learning after retiring or raising children.

When I see beginners frustrated and full of despair, I urge them on, for I know it can take years. Years. We all learn at different rates. We may measure success in masterpoints and value those who develop quickly, but thanks to another feature on the ACBL's website, I know that it took me 15 years to become a Life Master. I know that until four years ago I never earned more than 100 points in one year.

Make it work for you. Log on, click around. You aren't going to break the internet. Check out Bridge Winners. Google "bridge conventions" and content actually comes up! Create a clever BBO handle and get comfortable with the site so that you can compete in the District 20 finals for North American Pairs and Grand National Team events. The organizers and educators in D20 will help you.

Have you "liked" The Trumpet on Facebook yet? It was actually the best place to keep up with GNT results from DC since the ACBL frequently does not post KO results until the final. There are a lot of bridge players on Facebook. I have seen partnership and teammate requests, advice on how to bid hands, and a whole lot of cute animal pictures. Speaking of cute animals. I'd feel pretty guilty if I didn't mention my girls, Cookie and Beans.

Who are you calling not aggressive enough?

A week before I was to leave for Washington DC, I left work not feeling well but not really sure what was wrong. I started figuring it out on the drive home, and by the time I made it to my exit there was no doubt: another kidney stone.

Considering it had only been three months since I'd been declared all clear, I was having a hard time believing it, but a CT scan proved me right. The good news was that it was about a third of the size of the last one and wouldn't require surgery.

Also, as I'd noticed by the end of the week, the pain was really intermittent — I could go a couple days without feeling it. Or longer, as the stretch continued.

The first day of the GNT wasn't a good day. No serious pain, but I wasn't feeling great and I definitely wasn't playing well. In the first match, I misplayed a cold game. Our opponents also bid really aggressively to a hard-to-find game, and between those two boards we were down 23 IMPs. I went in and out all day, never getting into a rhythm. By the end of the day, we had recovered enough to qualify 14th out of 16.

"If you've got somebody fairly conservative at the other table, you're going to be up 40 IMPs," one of our opponents had said rather presciently. I told them **Amy** and **Dawn** were actually our most aggressive pair. "I think we're the conservative ones," Jake added, speaking mainly for himself.

We were sitting out the next two quarters - unfortunately, now that I was feeling better and playing better – but I was glad to be sending in **Bob** and **July**.

Our team had disasters on the first two boards of the second quarter,

losing 24 IMPs. We won the other 12 boards 30-2. I'd much rather be up 80-12 at halftime than 80-36, but at least our lead grew. In the third quarter, the supermight be making five or even 6♣, and there was no need to push them into it, especially at the risk of getting doubled vulnerable. But knowing their teammates had specifically told them we were conservative — when would anyone ever believe that again? — I saw a golden opportunity to bluff a 4 bid, feeling really confident they would buy it. They did — no double. Jake came down with a terrific 2-count:

▲4 ♥5 4 2 **♦**Q 9 8 7 6 3 2 **♣**3 2.

When both heart honors turned out to be onside, I made five. With 14 HCP opposite 2, we had missed an impossible-to-bid game. "There's no way they'll be there," our opponents told us. "Even they're not that aggressive." (They were; lose 10.)

Dan doubled this, holding ♣K9732. Bob, who was on lead, holding the AQJ6, obliged by leading the



What if I held the A-Q over the king? He admitted it could cost, but nothing else would really work either.



Had I chosen to cuebid instead of using RKCB, then it would be apparent that we were off the \clubsuit A, so some might find the lead anyway. I don't mind bad results when they happen against good players who find good plays. Well, I don't mind them as much.

The top four seeds get to pick their opponents for the beginning of the knockout stage, but having made it to quarterfinals two years in a row, I didn't think we'd be anyone's choice. I expected at worst a 13 if they had to pick among the bottom four.

I felt much better the next day. Then I found out that we had drawn a 15. The team we'd faced first match had gualified second and they picked us!

I was determined to show them what a mistake that was. By the end of the first quarter we were up 50-10. Mainly Jake and I sat back and collected our IMPs as they overbid time and again.


aggressive pair finally started getting lucky on overbids, cutting our lead to 13. Still, I wasn't worried. As they had seating rights last quarter, they dispatched Jake and

me to the other table. Their plan was to keep bidding aggressively, counting on us not to find the

same lucky games. Definitely not worried. Four boards into the fourth quarter, vulnerable against not, I held:

♠10 8 5 2 ♥A Q 10 7 ♦A K J 4 ♣8. I opened 1♦, LHO overcalled 2♣, Jake made a preemptive raise to 3 and RHO competed with $4\clubsuit$.

It had to be completely wrong for me to bid again. It was clearly their hand; they

My LHO apparently declined to open with 12 HCP because she couldn't stomach having to rebid her wretched diamond suit. But when her partner bid the suit, with six known tricks and stoppers in both majors, she jumped to 3NT.

We have five cashing clubs if we can find them, but Jake couldn't fathom she would bid 3NT without a club stopper.

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NAP AND GNT GNT Open team reaches semifinals

District 20 was well represented in the Grand National Teams finals at the NABC in Washington DC. Three of four flights qualified for the knockout stage, all but A. Our open team made the semifinals after beating the Meckwell squad. Flight C won its second-day match and made it to the quarterfinal. Flight B lost on the last board in the round of 16.

'You cannot play with fear'

Eric Stoltz describes a hand that helped in the win over Meckwell:

"If South had about 15, the most North could hold was about 4 points. Plus, with Roger's hand being over the opening notrump bidder, it was clear to me with a nice 6-count plus three 10s that the hand belonged to us.

"Over the Rodwell's redouble, I passed, which we play as forcing — once we double the opponents' notrump they cannot play in 2^{\checkmark} or lower undoubled. Over 2^{\clubsuit} , Roger showed good values and defense against clubs.

"When 2♠ passed back to me, I doubled, knowing we were big favorites to defeat the contract, although no certainty. We led trump early and beat 2♠ two tricks for plus 300 and a mid-size pickup compared to a partscore in the other room."

Eric had only 6 points, but he doubled Meckwell. "You have to take the percentage action, even against world-class play-

Roger added, "No matter how good they are, you cannot play with fear." Our open team almost didn't get to play Meckwell. In the round of 16 they ended play after 60 boards in an exact tie. They continued on when they won the eight-board playoff by 26 IMPs.

Our flight B and C teams included teenage players **Jake Olsen** and **Louis Beauchet**. These strong young players foretell future success for our district.

They were involved in some very swingy hands. In Flight C, playing with Louis, **Kevin Marnell** appreciated the power of his 7–6 hand. Holding:

♠— ♥AKQ752 ♦KQJ8743 ♣—, he opened 1♥ and rebid 6♦. At the other table they languished in 4♥.

A not-so-grand result

On another hand the result was not as good. Kevin stretched to bid a grand slam, which was doubled and redoubled. Down one! Meanwhile the other table bid only 5. Kevin explains:

"It was the last quarter and we were down by 50, so we were looking for ways to swing some IMPs.

"After my takeout double of 3♠, Louis bids 6♠. I should have passed, knowing Louis might be stretching some, but I started thinking about how much worse my hand could be and what Louis could

Playing partner for six diamonds to the A–Q or AQJxx, along with the \forall K and likely four spades that could be ruffed in dummy, and having only promised three diamonds with his double, Kevin bid 7 \blacklozenge .

"I redoubled, thinking that I am swinging a few more IMPs our way. In hindsight, I am giving them a way to make a lot of IMPs, so this was not a good call."

On the lead of the ♠A, Louis ruffed in dummy, but when diamonds didn't break the contract was down one. It's not any worse on a club lead because West ruffs with his natural trump trick.

"At any rate we were not going to get the swing we wanted."

Board reviews, resolves BBO issues

The District 20 board met in Boise to review issues from last May during the finals of the Open and B flights of our GNT. **Merlin Vilhauer** reported that the new partnership between the ACBL and BBO should eventually result in reduced problems and timelier reporting of the results. Similarly, **Jeff Jacob** told me that the ACBL has upgraded directors' laptops, which will make things easier for him.

The board authorized the North American events committee to develop minimum network specifications for the clubs and to develop BBO training programs for the players and monitors. The goal is to reduce situations in which one club's network problems or some player's inexperience disrupts the entire district.

The board also made an immediate determination regarding equipment and software that players use for accessing BBO. While tablets work when you are playing for fun, the interface does not work well for tournament play. At least until BBO changes its interface to provide the communication functions needed for tournament play, tablets should not be used in our online events.

All players are encouraged to use browsers that are the most compatible with BBO. At this time it seems that Chrome works better than Safari.

Profit doubles in Sunriver; OTR is also up

We held our second and final board meeting of the year at the **Great Potato Regional** in Boise, with excellent attendance by board members and other officers. The tournament venue worked nicely and local attractions were great fun, so I encourage everyone to consider attending the Boise regional in 2018.

Halfway through the year, the district showed a loss of \$6,788. The good news is this is a smaller loss, by about \$3,500, than we had projected. Reserves stand at \$180,871.

The **Oregon Trail Regional** hosted 1,499 tables, down seven from the prior event. With the fee increase instituted at the beginning of 2016 (from \$11 to \$12) and expenses remaining flat, this tournament was slightly more profitable. The **High Desert Regional**, in Sunriver, grew by 11%, to 1,142.5 tables, and doubled net income from what it was two years ago.

Thanks to her meeting with management at the Wyndham Hotel, Tournament Contracts Negotiator **Marilyn Vilhauer** received promises of a far more favorable contract in Boise for 2018.

Hal Montgomery reported on issues with the GNT district finals playoffs, mostly computer related. He plans on writing procedures designed to head off such problems in the future. Hal also plans to set up classes for players who want to learn about playing on BBO.

Tournament Manager **Judy Davis** brought up issues surrounding the Monday afternoon game in Eugene in 2017. After discussion, the board voted to cancel this event. Upon the board's recommendation, Judy agreed to bring back a knockout starting on Monday in Seaside.

Deborah Lackey asked the board's advice for the venue for the teacher and director courses for 2018. The board suggested that she pursue holding them at the Oregon Trail Regional.

Elections for area representatives are due this year for Area 1, which must fill the seat currently held by Sam Asai. This area covers the Ontario, Mid-Columbia and Vancouver units. Area 5, Portland, has already held its election, and Mike Eyer will replace Molly Harris starting next year. Area 7, which comprises Bend, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Jackson County, must hold an election this year, too. Gee Gee Walker is the current representative and is also secretary of the board. Anyone interested in running for either of the open positions can find election procedures at acbld20.org. The board passed a policy regarding electronic equipment at district events. The policy is available in the Manual of Policies and Procedures on our website and will be posted at our events. The board will honor one of our youth players, Louis Beauchet, at the Oregon Coast Regional later this month. Louis placed third in a national event, the Freeman Mixed Board-a-Match, at the recent NABC in Washington DC and brought home a total of 137 masterpoints. In the interest of cutting expenses, the board will not meet again until February 2017 at the Oregon Trail Regional. The draft minutes from the meeting at Boise are posted on our website. Teachers' Corner From students to players: crossing the hurdle

We covered a number of topics at the ACBL teacher-certification course held at the Sunriver regional. Among the most in-

teresting was the challenge of transitioning students from classes to playing in club games.

Playing in a competitive environment can be intimidating for new players who can barely remember that bidding goes clockwise beginning with the dealer. We can tell them practice will improve their game, but many are still afraid they will make fools of themselves.

We discussed several ways of helping them overcome their fears. One suggestion was to partner a novice with a more experienced player for the novice's inaugural duplicate game.

That player could act as an "ambassador" — not a mentor, but rather someone who helps to ensure that the new player has a

good time. He or she could guide the novice through table movements, make introductions and, if an infraction is committed, confirm that the director's call is part of the game.

There are two types of sanctioned games ideal for helping students make the transition. The first is Bridge Plus, for students with 0–5 masterpoints. This is a "controlled" game that can be run by an accredited

teacher. The minimum number of boards played is only six, and the laws are less stringently applied.

There is also a Newcomer game for

players with 0–20 masterpoints. This game involves 14 to 21 boards and is run by a director in a more club-type atmosphere. To learn more, search "Handbook for Lesson Games" at *acbl.org*.

The ACBL also offers two handouts: "Bridge Life," a magazine along the lines of the Bridge Bulletin but targeting newer players, and "Welcome to the World of Duplicate Bridge," a pamphlet detailing what one can expect to find in a duplicate game. Both items are free, including shipping. To order copies for your students, go to Clubs > Marketing > Handouts at *acbl.org*.

If you have success stories of students transitioning into duplicate games, please let me know what worked for you.

The Bidding Toolbox

How to compete against four-level preempts

Competing against weak-two bids has been discussed in this column before. But when opponents preempt at the four level and you have a nice hand, competing can be difficult.

You suspect the hand belongs to you, but the opponents have erected a roadblock. And if there is no makeable contract available for your side, you want to exact a penalty against the other side or find a reasonable sacrifice, if available.

There are ways to over-



come the four-level preempt obstacle. You need to have some bids that convey your intentions. You and your partner must be sure to discuss them thoroughly so that you know your agreements and won't forget them. And you want agreements with no am-

biguity in them. After a preempt at the four level, you have three

options: pass, bid or double. To ensure clarity, you and your partner must first agree whether a double is for takeout or penalty. Many partnerships play that double is takeout through 4, So, a double of 4♠ is for penalty. Others play takeout doubles through 4♠. Indicate your agreement on your convention card.

You want to double for takeout in two cases:

 You have support for whatever partner bids and you think you can make the contract because of the strength of your hand.

• Or you believe the preempt bidder may make her contract, and you think a sacrifice will produce a better result for your side. You still need a strong hand or your sac will not be a good one.

Here's a hand that fits the first case after the opponent opens $4 \blacklozenge$:

▲AKJ10 **♥**KQJ4 **← ▲**AJ1053

Keep in mind that partner is likely to hold a few points, especially if LHO is the dealer and RHO is the preempter. And what points he holds are likely not in diamonds, thus they will help you. But even if you catch your partner with a weak hand, his holding only the $\blacklozenge Q$ or $\blacklozenge Q$ can make your hand golden.

Here's a hand that fits the second case after the opponent opens $4 \forall$ and they are vulnerable, you are not:

▲KQJ10 **♥**— **♦**AQJ64 **♣**QJ109 Say the preempter holds:

♦— **♥**KQJ1087543 **♦**62 **♣**A3

If he finds his partner with as little as one of the minor kings, the 4♥ contract is cold. In that case, your going down one at 4♠ or down two at five of a minor is a winning result. Yes, he might open 2♣ with that four-loser hand, but he's taking a chance that the opps will have an easier time finding a makeable fit. After all, he has only 10 HCP.

The key is that you may find partner with the right cards to make your bid after you double the preempter, but if you don't and you go down, it probably means the preempter can make his bid.

Besides doubling, your other two options are passing or bidding. Deciding whether to pass is a no-brainer. You don't have the strength to compete. There are a couple of options, however, when bidding:

You bid your own long suit to play.

• Or you bid 4NT with a good twosuiter. "Good" means the suits are pretty solid. You shouldn't have suits like these: QJ9865 or AJ9854.

In the first case, you might hold this against a 4♥ preempter:

▲AKQJ753 **♥**6 **♦**KQ5 **♣**A4 Bid 4♠. Finding partner with as little as the •J will make the hand.

Another hand that fits the first case:

♠94 ♥— ♦AKQJ8732 ♣KQ7

With favorable vulnerability, you can bid 5, knowing that the most you can go down is two doubled, which is a better result than the vulnerable game the preempter is likely to make.

Here's a two-suit hand that fits the second case against a preempter of any suit at the four level. For this example, let's say the preempt is 4. You hold:

♦— **♥**KQJ1073 **♦**AQJ1062 **♣**8

When you bid 4NT ("I have a twosuiter"), your partner responds with his best suit that isn't the preempter's suit. If he bids clubs, you bid diamonds, thus showing diamonds and hearts, and your partner either passes or corrects. In this case, if he bids diamonds or hearts, you just pass.

Let's say you hold instead:

♦— **♥**KQJ1053 **♦**4 **♣**AQJ1076

After you bid 4NT (showing a twosuiter), and your partner responds either clubs or hearts, you pass. If he responds

diamonds, you bid 5♥ and now he knows your two suits are hearts and clubs. He can pass $5 \forall$ with as little as a singleton. If he is short in hearts, he can bid 6♣ with better clubs and more than a bust. If he has a yarborough, he can pass 5even with a void, preferring to let you play at the five level. After all, he knows your suits are solid.

If you and your partner adopt these methods to deal with four-level preempts. it will give you tools you can use with no risk of ambiguity and improve your chances of optimal results.





For Sherry Squirrel, it is an 'unusual' 2NT indeed

Sherry Squirrel was happy to be playing with Franny Fox again. Sherry was chattering away while her partner attempted to discuss their convention card. She focused for the opening notrump range and Stayman and weak twos. She remembered upside-down signals. Yes, our range for one-level suit overcalls is 9-16 HCP. Blah, blah, blah ... those pesky convention cards. After that, Sherry wondered if Franny

was a fan of "House of Cards." Then she

Sherry's mind returned to her game with Franny. Sitting east, Sherry picked up this hand: **▲**AK84 **♥**9542 **♦**A865 **♣**10

The auction started. On her left, the dealer, Steve Owl, bid 14. Franny bid 2NT, then pass and then to Sherry.

Sherry remembered being told that if you are responding to notrump, Stayman is a good way to find a 4-4 fit. So she bid 3♣; opener doubled, Franny passed and Sherry's right-hand opponent bid 3♠.

Figuring that Franny passed because she lacked a four-card major, Sherry thought, "I am not going to let that person who could not bid over 2NT just steal our game."

Two-Suited Bids by Franny Fox

Over a one-level bid, if you make a takeout double and then bid notrump, you show a hand too strong to overcall 1NT (15-18 HCP). But if you jump to 2NT, you are not showing a balanced hand. Instead, you are showing a very unbalanced hand, a two-suited hand, "unusual," you could say.

 If you jump to 2NT over one of a major, you show at least 5-5 in the minors.

 If you jump to 2NT over one of a minor, you show at least five hearts and five of the other minor.

Keep it simple. Points do not matter unless you are vulnerable and they are not. Watch vulnerability when making two-suited bids.

So Sherry bid 3NT. Steve Owl passed and then Franny bid 4♣. "Dang," Sherry thinks. "Could that be Gerber? Can't be -I will just put us back in notrump."

So she bids 4NT and gets a dirty look from Franny. "What is the problem? We should have plenty of points." Now Franny bids 5♣. Sherry figures it must be clubs she likes. She passes, Steve doubles and everyone passes.

This has been the auction:

She also figures that Franny could have 10 of her points in clubs and a bad break. But she will be happy when she sees my three tricks and the \clubsuit 10.

Wait a minute. Steve Owl is putting down a card to lead. Turns out it is the $\blacklozenge9$.

Sherry panics as she realizes. "Oh no. I am playing it!" Sherry takes her ♠A and leads the \clubsuit 10, which holds. Then she learns that the bad break is really bad.

After the hand is over, minus 1100 later, Franny comments, "That 2NT overcall is a much longer discussion than we have time for at the table" (see box). Sherry sighs and thinks the bar next door would be a good first stop after the game.

Here is the full hand. You figure out what you might have done.

In NABC debut, Louis makes a splash

Fifteen-year-old Louis Beauchet of Sherwood, Ore., has become a familiar face around District 20.

Louis began studying the game in France at age 9, and after his family relocated to Oregon two years ago, Louis began playing bridge at the South Waterfront's Mirabella club, frequently winning and impressing everyone with his card play and composure — but perhaps confusing them with his aggressive bidding.

Since then he has formed new partnerships, catching the eye of many top players willing to play with a young protégé, and branched out to compete in most area tournaments.

He has continued to win and amass masterpoints, including a virtual tie in last year's Mini-McKenney for the district in his category, and placing eighth nationally among youth players. Currently he is leading the national Mini-McKenney 100-200 race by 100 points and is just a few points shy of earning Life Master after only two years in the ACBL.

Playing in the GNT Flight C in May with Kevin Marnell, David Muller and Roy Wilkinson, Louis earned a trip to Washington DC, his first national tournament.

It was a big success: His GNT team reached the quarterfinals, losing to the team that won the event; he won a regional pairs event with Merlin Vilhauer; and he played on a team that placed third in the Freeman Mixed Board-a-Match, netting 137 masterpoints in two weeks.

The competition was pretty tough in both the limited and open events, Louis said. After getting knocked out of the GNT on Friday, the team stayed together for a bracket 6 knockout, reaching the semifinal Sunday. On Monday, Louis played in the open pairs with Vilhauer.

"This was almost easier," Louis said. "All of the good players were in national events, so the field was pretty weak, definitely weaker than in the Vancouver or Seaside regionals."

Tuesday saw Louis take a break. He was able to meet two of the top French players, ACBL Player of the Year Cedric Lorenzini and Jean Quantin, and kibbitz them in the Spingold.

"I was surprised to see them playing the most standard system," Louis said. "It goes to show you don't need many gadgets to be a good bridge player."

Cedric and Louis have many things in common: they both started at the same age, their parents do not play, and they both do not like playing with juniors.

"I know many people wonder why I didn't play in the Youth NABC," Louis said. "I wasn't against trying to play with kids my age, but after what I saw, I will definitely keep playing with adults." On the second day of the GNT, Louis and company faced a District 13 team made up of University of Chicago students. Last year, when Oren Kriegel was on their team, they won the College Bowl; this year they were fourth in that event.

"I was thinking, 'Nice! I will see how it is to play with young players," Louis said. "To be honest, it was a bad experience. First, they didn't say a word for seven hours; second, they were very bad; and third, they seemed to have a 'facial language,' very inappropriate at a bridge table."

Later, at the tail end of the tournament, Louis was back with his GNT partner, Kevin, for the Red Ribbon Pairs on Friday and Saturday. After a reasonable first session, they had a monster second session, winning their section and qualifying in fourth place for the second day. But in the final, a bad first session took them out of contention. Still they made the overalls, finishing in 26th place.

Although going to an NABC and plaving in limited or regional events can be rewarding, the real reason to go is to compete against the best in the world. Louis got this opportunity when his planned partner for Thursday found himself double-booked.

Dan Hoekstra, a fellow Portland player who had discussed playing with Louis, had also enlisted the services of Karen and Jade Barrett, along with Donna Lombardini, professional players based in South Dakota. After they were knocked out of the Spingold on Tuesday, losing to the top-seeded Nickell team, they were planning to enter the Mixed BAM, a twoday event, starting the next day.

When Hoekstra told Jade of his conflict, Louis was added to the team. Because it was a mixed teams event. Louis would rotate in and out with Dan, who was playing with Karen, a Grand Life Master.

On the first day of the BAM, a two-session qualifier, Louis played the first half. The team was well above average going into the second session, so the pressure was on Dan. He felt exhausted by the end of the session, but they qualified tied for 10th in a tight field going into the final.

Louis and Karen started again, playing the whole first session, after which the team was tied for first place. Now the pressure was *really* on. Although a couple of errors stood out it isn't clear how costly they were. The team finished less than a board out of first and only 0.25 behind second place.

Jade Barrett was impressed. "The kid played great," he said.


For Hoekstra, this was his best finish in a national event. After all his time working on his game, he said he felt like he was making progress.

"One of the hardest aspects of bridge is partnership skills," Dan said. "If you grow your partnership skills, the bridge will come. You enjoy it when you work hard together; it is not an individual achievement. But there is great satisfaction in performing well."

Mistakes are just a part of bridge. A big part of the game is learning how to move on after one occurs. Dan said that Jade is excellent at inspiring confidence after bad results. He tells his team to center themselves, and to allow mistakes to "light a fire" and make you fight harder. For Louis, playing in a national event for the first time, the difference was apparent. "You don't get any gifts," Louis said. "You have to play solid and to be constantly focused if you want to end up with a great result. It was even tougher the second day because only the best teams survived. But I loved it, and it was a good experience."

No tricks? No problem

A memorable board played by Jake Olsen made it into the Daily Bulletin in Washington DC. This is from the first session of the Wernher Open Pairs.



North–South are cold for 7♠ but few reached it. Many played in 6♠, and many others in $4 \bigstar$, while some defended $7 \bigstar$ doubled for 800, a better score than those who only reached 4♠ for 710.

Among the best scores for East-West was minus 450. How is this possible when North-South are vulnerable?

Olsen opened 3♦ and North passed. His partner, JD Kurtzman of Cincinnati OH, saw his 6 highcard points and singleton spade as a red flag that the opponents had a big spade fit and and most of the points. He psyched 3♠. That kept

South out of the

auction, and Olsen bid 3NT. Because running to diamonds was possible, neither opponent doubled.

North led the ♣7 to South's ace, and a club was returned to North's king. North cashed his three other winners and led a spade to South's good hand, leaving Olsen with zero tricks. Down nine: minus 450 was worth 49 out of 51 matchpoints.

hund mix named Zoie and a 4year-old Shorkie named Maizy.



Carle: Board adds policies on electronic devices, reserves

At the regional, the board met Aug. 11 to receive and discuss reports from officers and area representatives. We reviewed and approved financial statements, which showed a loss for the first six months of 2016 despite good regional attendance and increased player fees. The finance committee will reassess the economic situation prior to the next board meeting at the Oregon Trail Regional in February and will recommend a budget for 2017 based on its assessment.

The committee also agreed to recommend a policy on reserve levels, which would be added to the Manual of Policies and Procedures. This policy is intended to guide the board as to how aggressively it should address measures necessary to maintain an adequate financial base. The board voted to extend a ban on electronic equipment instituted during the Boise tournament to all District 20 tournaments. The policy (*see page 8*) will be added to the MOPP.

Many players expressed disappointment in the Seaside schedule that omitted a knockout starting on Monday evening. So, due to popular demand, the board added it back in. Players can now choose to play in a one-session charity pairs or Swiss or to enter the Seaside Bracketed KOs.

Although the District 20 bylaws require the board to meet just twice yearly, we have met three times annually in recent years. To cut costs, we agreed to scale back to just twice yearly, which means we will not formally meet at Seaside this fall. Instead, we will continue conducting some business through email correspondence and meet next in February at the Oregon Trail Regional in Vancouver.

The NAP club-qualifying period is over and the District 20 finals will take place in October. We encourage everyone to participate. We had some issues with online play the first weekend of the GNT, but things went much smoother the second weekend.

In my opinion, online is still the best way to determine champions in our large district. Did you read the nice article on GNT participation by **Chip Dombrowski** in the August Bridge Bulletin?

Thanks to all for your support of District 20 and see you in Seaside in late September.

process easier to change. This will enable clubs and tournaments to use any scoring program, because a common format can store the results, which can be used by headquarters to calculate the masterpoints and add them to the database. In the meantime, the board has agreed to not make any changes to the masterpoints structure for a bit, allowing this part of the scoring process to stabilize. districts would have a bigger say in what happens. More will be posted on this subject as the proceedings move along.

Notrump openings

The ACBL board removed a legal gray area surrounding semi-balanced notrump openers when it approved a change to the definition of a notrump opening in the General Convention Chart. The change allows hands that contain a singleton ace, king or queen, as long as they do not also contain a doubleton. Here is the new definition: "A notrump opening or overcall is natural if. by agreement, it contains no void, at most one singleton which must be the A, K or Q and no more than two doubletons. If the hand contains a singleton, it may have no doubleton." This includes hand patterns such as 5-4-3-1, 6-3-3-1 and 4-4-4-1, in addition to those that were previously included.

change of ideas, software and players." This money is in addition to the standard club sanction fees that BBO already pays. Other terms of the agreement include the two organizations expanding their cross-marketing to drive attendance to online and face-to-face games as well as conducting joint membership drives.

Board-shrinking proposal

The ACBL board has been under attack for many years as being too big – inefficient as a decision-making body – and costing too much money. A committee was formed with three board members, three outside ACBL members and three employees from headquarters to have a look on restructuring the board to be smaller and more efficient. A preliminary report will soon be available at *acbl.org*.

Some initial proposals were to reduce the board to nine members voted on at large by the units, as is now done for current board members. The board of governors would be changed to an advisory board and have two elected members from each district with a total of 50. The advisory board would form a committee to select people to run for the ACBL board based on areas of expertise — the nine seats would be assigned to subject areas based on need.

My feeling is that smaller districts like ours could lose some input, while larger

Bridge Base Online

The ACBL reached an agreement with BBO, which will pay the ACBL \$500,000 per year for the next four years. ACBL will sanction only BBO robot games to be awarded masterpoints.

Uday Ivatury, BBO's chief executive officer says this: "BBO and ACBL share two goals: to promote bridge and to better serve our members. In addition to continuing to provide technical expertise and online exposure for ACBL, BBO will be paying a substantial royalty. I expect that our partnership will lead to a healthy ex-

Cheating trials

ACBL management presented charges of collusive unethical behavior to the Ethical Oversight Committee in hearings on two separate pairs of international superstar players: Lotan Fisher and Ron Schwartz from Israel and Fulvio Fantoni and Claudio Nunes from Italy. The hearings culminated in historic, lifetime expulsions of all four players, removal of all masterpoints and loss of all ACBL titles earned. In addition, any teammates who won when playing on teams with either of the convicted pairs during the past four years lose any of those titles and points.

Our club is making a great effort to recruit new members, and our latest catch is Steve Macklin. Steve's first encounter with the game of bridge occurred just six years



Another fairly new player, Gail Codding, dipped her toe into bridge by taking lessons from our Ontario bridge teachers,



Dear Heads They Win, Tails You Lose,

Granted that I learned bridge in the Dark Ages, but a double by partner would announce both that we have arrived at the final contract and that he thinks declarer will not succeed. After his pass, my double should suggest, in my opinion, that I have a hand suitable for defense and that I would not be embarrassed to display it as dummy should partner bid at the five level.

It is generally losing strategy to pull this double from fear of the opponents making their contract. 4NT in the passout seat usually describes "two places

to play," suggesting five-five or better distribution. That would be dangerous on this hand because partner, searching for our eight-card fit, might try 5♣ with only three (imagine:

◆7542 **♥**87 **♦**Q753 **◆**A103).

At matchpoints, West should pull the double to 5, a known fit favored by the scoring considerations. At teams, $5 \blacklozenge$ would certainly be a consideration because the doubler might be able to bid a slam, a close decision on this hand if he knows 5 was bid with a degree of confidence.

Having made such optimistic bids myself a few times, I can fathom it — but Jake is much more disciplined.

He led a heart, and declarer won in dummy and continued the suit, forcing out Jake's ♥A on the third round. Since she was marked with the ♠AQ and, Jake thought, the \clubsuit K, and had turned up with 3 points in hearts, she certainly couldn't have anything else as a passed hand. Jake got out with a diamond, hoping I would put a club through her imagined stopper when I got in with the \mathbf{A} , and his eventual spade would be the setting trick.

Six rounds of diamonds later, she still had a long heart and the \bigstar A for an overtrick.

After 13 boards our lead had winnowed to 4. The other table played 3♠ down two. If 3NT is also down two, we pick up 7. Alas, we lost 11, losing by 7. At least we were the most attractive team in the field.

Had we advanced, prospects looked good. Only four teams in the field including ours had past success in this event. A team that made it to the final last year didn't make it out of the first-day Swiss. A team with players who had won last year went out in quarterfinals. The fourth, with a player who won flight C in 2013, won.

After that, Jake and I managed to go average for four sessions in the 10K Pairs and then won a bracket 4 knockout before it was time for me to work as a Daily Bulletin editor for the last five days.

I got through most of both weeks without so much as noticing my kidney stone (it's still quietly kicking around), and had the pleasure of spending half the time sitting across from Jake, who I think is much better than most people realize. I hope we can do it again sometime.

When partner bid 1NT over the double, I knew he had something in hearts and likely a fit for one of my minors. So with three quick tricks and a void, I doubled $3 \mathbf{V}$, expecting a good result whether partner chose to leave it in, play four of a minor, or put me in $3\clubsuit$, and trusting partner to make the best choice.

When I heard 3NT, I suspected it was right to defend. I contemplated pulling it to $4\clubsuit$, which might make or at least be going down less than a terrible 3NT might (and did — down three).

Three-part question: 1) Is North's double too aggressive? 2) With the South cards, do you pass the double, bid 4♣ or try for 3NT? 3) Having doubled and heard what sounds like the worst possible answer. should North sit for 3NT or pull to 4♣? — Double Meant?

Dear Twin,

1) North's double appears to my weary eyes to be a virtually automatic call. Partner is known to have fewer than three spades and some, if not most, of his meager values are in hearts. North has tremendous defensive values, particularly if South has a hoped-for singleton spade.

2) In the postmortem, my opponents will swear that they had witnessed the famed "green flash" of a Hawaii sunset rather than a similar phenomenon caused by the rapidity of my pass card reaching the table. 44 is needless speculation and 3NT requires partner to have long, powerful spades, a holding inconsistent with his double.

3) If I think that I have reasonably described my hand, an uncommonly rare feeling, I don't overrule partner's decision. He might have:

♦K **♥**QJ3 **♦**QJ9752 **♣**932. 3NT would be a favorite to make!


