 that 25 members is too big and too ex pensive to run the organization properly. Many proposals have been made but nothing concrete is in the works. A smaller board

Five D20 players placed in Flight B national pairs events. In the Young 0-2500 Pairs, Ray Robert and Rick Prouser placed 17th and Chuck Swart 21st. Don Weber and Ellie Hood placed 19th in the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs.
In regional events, Dawn Campbell won the Friday open pairs and Gibson won a bracket 2 knockout. Swart and Jim Wiser were second in the International Fund Pairs. Robert and Prouser were second in the Thursday B/C Pairs.
In I/N events, Chris and Cindy Meyers of Dallas OR placed second in F in the Friday morning 299er pairs.

## A good partner is good to find; three is better

Tve often thought one of the hardest as pects of bridge is finding and keeping a good partner (cue Mae West joke now) Many bridge partnerships are forged in friendship, others random pairings that flourish, some never quite catch fire and fizzle after a few below-average sessions.
How much time and effort should one invest in a partner, and in the game? It depends on your goals. I think it should be important to be clear and up front when beginning a new partnership, as it's a lot like a re lationship. If there were an online site or app for bridge partners as there is for dating, what kind of questions or statements would be appropriate? Instead of "long walks on the beach, candlelit dinners and jazz," might you say, "2/1, UDCA, 1430, weak jump shifts"?
Maybe what is also necessary is to announce your commitment level, both timewise and in the sense of growing your game. It's perfectly fine to not care about tournaments and travel and be content to play locally and/or socially. If you're out there gunning for every regional and sectional and want to go to the nationals, it's a good idea to find a partner who is on the same page, unless you're OK finding yourself at the partnership desk.

Let's also be realistic about our skill level. You might be better than your masterpoint accumulation. Masterpoints aren't always a good indication of talent. Define the strongest and weakest aspects of your game and be honest about what you're working on. Playing with a partner who has more experience than you can help your game immeasurably - if you are willing to listen and learn and can handle the pressure of not wanting to let them down.
I am fond of saying it's best to have three types of partners. I know, it can be so hard to find one, but ideally you might have one you learn from, one you learn with and one you teach. Maybe you think you don't know enough to teach someone, but someday soon you will, and you can reinforce your own knowledge by imparting it to a newbie.
In essence my player roundup question was what makes a good partner by asking what would make you want to say goodbye to one. I asked one of my better partners (I am incredibly fortunate to have several whom I learn from, in fact maybe all of them) what he liked about playing with me. He said that I cared. It sounds pretty simple, but it's deceptively deep. Care enough to go over your mistakes and learn, to study even just a little bit, to

watch the cards; especially the small ones. Those things can make a big difference, not only in your game but in the vitality of your partnerships.
You're going to make mistakes, believe me. Just try to make them good mistakes and quit making the dumb ones. And instead of the tired old Mae West quote, how about this one, which I think works for bridge quite well: "Good judgment comes from experience. And experience? Well, that comes from poor judgment."

## Choosing the evil I haven't tried before

A week after wrapping up the summer Trumpet, I headed off to Cincinnati for a week at my newest - and at the moment only - annual tournament. I can drive there in a day and have free housing. When I was there last year, I met some people I like to play with. And it's scheduled during one of my only real breaks from the Trumpet, all of which adds up to a great reason to go back.
It was my first tournament in nine months, and I'd only been to one club game in six months. I expected to be rusty. I was pleasantly surprised the first couple days to find myself playing about as well as I ever have.
I did a player roundup a few years ago in Seaside about the hardest thing to learn at bridge. I believe the consensus was discipline - when to pass. No one who's ever played with me is going to believe this, but I've been working on that. You might even say I was a model of discipline in Cincinnati.
Even when you see how well it's working, it's hard to maintain it. I made it through the whole first day - 48 boards - without stepping out on a single bid. I made it through the first session the second day. I made it through 22 boards the second session, which was the final of a knockout.
Finally, after 94 boards of good behavior, I felt I'd earned the right to indulge myself. On the penultimate board I broke down.
I've never had any vices, because I've never wanted to. For me, rebidding my club suit vulnerable at the four level when I've already shown my hand is as real as temptation gets. They didn't even double me, because why would they double someone who's had his bid every time for 22 boards? Like I said, you wouldn't recognize me.

They didn't need to double. I played 4* down three vulnerable while our teammates made a partscore, costing us 5 IMPs. We ended up losing the match by 4. Is that cosmic justice or what? Yes, every person on the team made mistakes, and
any one of them could point to a blunder that blew at least 5 IMPs if not more.
It's not about fault. It's more about how close I came to not having any major bidding errors, which was a new experience for me, to say the least. I've been a risky player, and blowing my share of IMPs comes with the territory.
This time I made a decision that I knew was more likely to be wrong than right because I couldn't resist the temptation, even though I'd been resisting it to great success for two whole days. A large part of my early bridge success was an uncanny tendency to get rewarded for my bad bids far more often than I got punished. There's such a rush that comes from getting away with something. On account of my lack of a rebellious youth, I didn't experience that buzz until I started playing bridge.
Chip Dombrowski There is an art form to sniffing opportunities to rob the opponents, but you realize as you move into the bigger leagues that those chances diminish. It's important to be alert to those opportunities when they arise, but it's dangerous to be chasing them on every hand.
Still, as good as it feels to play well and win, it feels so much better to break all the rules and win. That's why it's so hard to learn discipline. If you think there's a chance you'll get away with it, it's hard to turn it down in favor of the slow-andsteady approach.
I think it was my last time in Seaside three years ago when I found myself playing $6 \star$ making six while the other table played $4 \diamond$ making four. The truth is we were both in the wrong contract. It makes five legitimately. But they didn't get their tricks, and my punishment for bidding one too many was winning 15 IMPs rather than 10 (the reward for $5 ४$ ). I could have lost 6.
We can agree it's not right to risk 16 IMPs to get 5 more, but that doesn't change that it feels great to do it when it pays off. (As Mae West said: "To err is human, but it
feels divine.") Of all the getting-away-withsomething rushes in bridge, I think making a lucky slam is the best.
How about a grand? This one isn't lucky. You hold:
-AJ42 A AKQ82 K 109 .
You're in first seat, red against white, at matchpoints. It's pretty easy to open 1* and plan to jump shift in spades after partner bids $1 \vee$, but what happens when partner bids 1 1 ?
All of the rebid choices are flawed. A splinter shouldn't be on a stiff ace, and a jump to game should be balanced. You might move straight to Blackwood, but are you going to find out what you need to know? Though it's a diamond short, 4 4 , showing a strong hand with a fit for spades and a long, strong diamond suit, is also a possibility.
I chose 4 $\mathbf{4}$, which was deemed a mas sive underbid by an expert panel, who opted for the splinter, despite the $\vee$, as the most productive move toward slam.
However, partner happens to be loaded, so you don't really have a way to go wrong on this hand. Any strong bid is going to prompt him to ask for key cards. When I showed three, partner bid 5NT, confirming he had the other two plus the Q and asking me to show my lowest outside king. I went straight to 7as. I have the K , the $\star \mathrm{K}$ and a singleton heart - second-round controls in all three side suits. Whatever my partner is looking for, I have it.
It makes, and we get a top board. I heard from other pairs in the field that "there's no way to bid the grand." Well, not if I make the robotic bid of $6 \boldsymbol{s}$.
When I arrive in Seaside next month, it will be my first time playing real bridge since Cincinnati, and those will be my only two tournaments this year - a long way down from 20 a few years ago. I'm looking forward to seeing all my Northwest bridge friends. Perhaps you'll notice a difference. But let's be real: I'm not making any promises about a 94 -board streak of discipline.

## NAP AND GNT

## How GNT teams fared; NAP coming soon

The GNT finals in Atlanta gave our four D20 teams a chance to measure themselves against teams from all over the ACBL
Our open team of John Ashton, Dennis Metcalf, Jim Elliot, Marc Zwerling, John Lusky and Randy Pickett finished 11th in the Swiss qualifying for the KO phase. The random draw placed them against the Martel-Stansby-Woolsey team, with its many national champions, who were too strong for our guys. Our flight A team of Joel Datloff, Michael Redden, Craig Jones and Charlene Martindale, augmented by David Brower and Linda Wiener, were 0.34 VP short of advancing in the qualifying Swiss. Our flight B team of Rick Prouser, Ray Roberts, Chuck Swart and Jim Wiser did not have a good day.
District 20 was well represented by its flight C team of Dan Edelstein, Andrew Nuxoll, Jon Gassaway, Roger Thomas, Kevin Marnell and Frank Straulemann. They came in sixth in the qualifying Swiss and continued on in the KO portion where they won two matches. They beat the sec-
ond seed by 40 in the quarterfinals before losing in the semifinals. They finished third fourth in the nation. (See story, page 8.)

## 2019 GNT and subsidies

Qualifying for the 2019 Grand National Teams is going on now and runs through the end of February. Clubs throughout the district will be having qualifying games. Our qualifying requirements are very generous. We want everybody to play. I will help you form teams and find playing venues. Win a trip to Las Vegas next July. The subsidies have changed since last year. We now allocate $\$ 200$ per team, up to a maximum of nine, that play in the finals of each bracket, toward the team subsidy for that bracket. We further augment the subsidy with $\$ 300$ per flight from our Grass Roots Fund. The maximum total is now $\$ 2,100$, among the most generous in the ACBL. I hope we get the full amount in each bracket.

## NAP

The online finals of our North American

Pairs are Oct. 20 for flights A and C and Oct. 21 for flight B . You must have qualified in a club to be eligible. The NAP is for players of all ability ranges. We have three brackets in the NAP finals and qualify 11 pairs for the nationals. Get your friends and partners together and plan your own bridge party if your local club is not hosting a venue. If you need help finding partners and/or a venue, please contact me. Win a trip to Memphis with its fabulous barbecue. D20 continues to add to the subsidies that are provided by the ACBL.
Our online finals are an opportunity for players to compete against players of their own ability level and win gold and red points without having to travel. You can get together at a friend's house, play bridge, eat party food and win gold points. In our GNTs last spring, we had bridge parties at private homes in four states.

## Strategic Thinking

## Declarer strategy: Choosing your line of play

In my previous articles, I focused mostly on bidding strategy. It's now time to move on to cardplay strategy, and first we'll see how to be a strategic declarer.
An average declarer in an average field will be declarer around a quarter of the time. When you are declarer, you can't count on partner to help you, so it is very important to have your own strategy, and to establish it as soon as dummy comes down. So every time you become declarer and your partner puts his hand down, you should pause and assess your options.
Some hands may be straightforward, in which case your strategy can be lines of play, and in these cases you should decide which one to adopt before playing to trick one; so many mistakes are made because declarers play too fast at trick one Once you have chosen your line of play, you have to display your declarer skills to follow it. Here I'm going to explain how to choose your line of play. But because that strategy differs a lot whether you are play-
ing IMPs or matchpoints, we'll need to study both types of game.
In this issue, we'll talk about IMPs games. In IMPs, your main (if not only) goal is to make your contract. Overtricks don't really matter (they are worth 0 to 2 IMPs depending on what contract your teammates are defending), but going down in a contract because you unsuccessfully tried for an overtrick can cost up to 17 IMPs.
So when you are declaring a hand at IMPs, you have to choose the line of play that has the best chance to lead you to the number of tricks you need to make your contract. That means you sometimes have to adopt unusual lines of play. Take this example. As declarer, you hold:

ゅAKJ4 3 ヤK4 Q 63 ¢ 662 , and dummy comes down with

↔752 QU5 3 AK 2 A Q 5.
The contract is 40 and the opening lead is $\boldsymbol{\operatorname { s }}$. At IMPs, your goal is to take 10 tricks. So you win the A and play a spade to the jack. Wrong! On a bad day your LHO will win the $\mathbf{Q}$, give your RHO a club ruff, get in with the $\vee$ A and give RHO a second club ruff. Down one.
You should instead win the club lead and cash the AK, giving you a $100 \%$ chance
to make your contract, unless your RHO started with all five spades, but in that case there was nothing you could have done. Here, choosing a safe route to 10 tricks at trick one will occasionally lead to big swings in your favor. But sometimes, it's the opposite. If you are declaring a desper ate contract at IMPs (we've all been there) and need a miracle to make it, go for it. Imagine the only layout that would allow you to make your contract and base your line of play on this miracle layout. If you go down an extra trick or two, the loss will be small. But if you get lucky and make your contract, the win will be huge.
Follow these guidelines and you will improve your results:

- Pause briefly before playing your first card (even if there is a singleton in dummy) - Decide on how many tricks you think you need to make to get an average or better score (this will depend on the type of game you are playing in, on the strength of the field, on the contract you are in).
- Choose the line of play that has the best chance to lead you to your trick targe (a slight chance is still better than nothing)
- Use your skills to realize your goal. Next issue: Strategy at matchpoints

Laws of the Game Making a proper claim

You're the declarer in a notrump contract. You've just won a trick with the A in your hand and now, with only five tricks left to play, your hand is $\vee$ AKQJ 10. Obviously, you could play out your hearts one by one, but why should you? You know you're going to win all five tricks, so don't waste everyone's time. Make a claim
Of course, it's not always that easy to see you'll take all the remaining tricks, especially in a suit contract where you just might have forgotten to pull all the trump, or where you've forgotten that a

Trumpet Contributor king has yet to appear and is, unfortunately, offside. So what's the correct procedure for making - or de fending - a claim? First, declarer announces that he will win a certain number of tricks. It need not be all remaining tricks; he may concede an ace, for example.
Second, he faces his cards, placing them on the table for all to see.
Third, and most importantly, he must state the line of play he intends to follow to take the tricks he has claimed. This is critical because declarer will be bound by this line of play, and cannot change it if he learns that there is a potentially fatal defect, a missing trump, for example. If declarer fails or declines to state a line of play, defenders should immediately call the director.
If declarer states a line of play, and it is clear that he will indeed take the promised number of tricks, the defenders may accept the claim, and the hand will be completed and scored accordingly.
As of Jan. 1, 2018, if all four players agree, they may play out the hand, starting with the first step of declarer's line of play, without calling the director.
But what if one of the defenders believes the claim is invalid? Call the director. The director will confirm that the declarer has stated a line of play, then will have all parties face their cards and will determine if the claim is proper.
Under no circumstances should a defender volunteer information that

Today I'm going to revel in my good board; tomorrow I may decide to go over the eight disgusting bad boards. Or maybe I will invite Franny over, lure her over with a nice cabernet and discuss our boards over wine. So I pick up this lovely hand first seat.

I open $1 \downarrow$. Next Franny bids $1 \vee$, the opponents passing throughout. I bid 2\&, and she bids 3NT. What do I know? I think she has at least 14 HCP and I have 15 HCP and two five-card suits. I do love
those five-card suits
So over 3NT, I bid 4NT (ace asking), she answers $5 \downarrow$, which is 3 or 0 key cards, so bid 6 NT (hoping that it was 3 and not 0 ). Pass, pass, double! Oops guess I was wrong. Of course she couldn't include the $\bullet K$ since I held that card.

Oops, forgot to mention, my brilliant partner, Franny Fox made 6NT doubled. There was only one pair making their slam in the big dog group and they were in $6 \star$. We were the only pair bidding slam in our group (so maybe they were right to double).

## Laws: How claim issues are resolved

might be helpful to declarer; e.g., "What about the trump I have that you forgot to draw?" Armed with this knowledge, declarer will be sure to state in his claim that his first act will be to draw the last trump. If he might otherwise have forgotten about the 13th trump, defenders may lose a trick they might have taken. In ruling on a contested claim, the di-
rector adjudicates the result of the board as equitably as possible. However, "any doubtful point as to a claim shall be resolved against the claimer," says ACBL. In summary, declarer should be sure she is right before making a claim, and defenders should not accept any possibly defective claim.

# Extra time spent thinking on opening lead pays off 

After four years plumbing popular bidding conventions in The Bidding Toolbox, Trumpet columnist Jim Flint shifts to a new focus with Play of the Hand

This competitive auction in a club game resulted in the side with the boss suit prevailing. In the bidding, that is.
North considered bidding on, hoping for a good matchpoint score at down one if West can make 3 . But he liked his defensive chances with four spades to the king, so passed.
What should North lead against 3 ? Should he lead a heart to make sure his side gets its heart tricks before they're sluffed on good diamonds?
If he leads a heart, it's smooth sailing for

West. If South continues hearts West wins with the king and leads to the K , to cut communication between East and West, afraid of diamond ruffs
Then when West pulls trumps, it doesn't do North any good to lead his singleton diamond after he takes his $\mathbf{~ K}$. West lets it hold to preserve his entry to the diamonds. Now North can't get to South for a diamond ruff.
If South switches to a diamond on the second trick, it's too late. West can bring the contract home, losing a spade, a diamond ruff, a heart and a club.
North, however, had second thoughts about his opening lead. East-West didn't bid game, so South might have two entries. If so, North could lead his singleton king, likely dead anyway, and hope for two diamond ruffs after he gets in with the $\boldsymbol{L}$ He plunked down the $\diamond K$, taken by the ace. West should just cash the A and lead another one, hoping for a 3-2 break in trumps. He can afford one diamond ruff but not two.
Here, when North takes his $\boldsymbol{\wedge}$, he leads a heart to his partner for a diamond ruff. Then, since South took the heart with the ace, denying the king, North tries a club back, which works, and he gets a second diamond ruff. Down one, for the top score. Count to 10 before you make the opening lead. Sometimes thinking outside the box pays off.

## Teachers' Corner

## ACBL revamps teacher certification workshop

The ACBL has replaced its old Teacher Accreditation Program for a new, revamped Best Practices Teacher Workshop. I attended the new program at the Atlanta NABC to see what it was about.
Weeks before the course, a test covering basic bridge knowledge was sent out. If the test was not passed with a $70 \%$ score, would-be students were not allowed to take the workshop. The three-day seminar was a fast-paced, highly interactive process relying on teachers learning from their interactions and experiences. The facilitator's objective was not to speak for more than five to seven minutes at a time.
The workshop emphasizes giving students more hands-on activities, not putting any student on the spot, encouraging students and allowing them to make mistakes as part of their learning.
Several demonstrations on teaching methods were included in the workshop. At the end, participants could sign up for an assessment where a 12 -minute lesson is taught, demonstrating proficiency. Unlike other accreditation programs, a teacher does not earn a Best Practices accreditation unless the BP Teacher evaluation is passed.
After passing the assessment, teachers receive a certificate, special pin, access to special templates and logos, as well as being listed in the ACBL Teacher Directory as a Best Practices Teacher. The ACBL has a schedule on its website of future workshops to be offered.

My favorite piece of advice she gave to the newer players was, "If you play only once a week, you will be a weak player.'
Her husband, Alex Kornel, accompanied her during this trip. They played all week and were available to players seeking assistance on difficult hands they had encountered.

During the run-up, there were some very interesting hands. In the qualifying Swiss, Roger and Jon reached a doubled slam on the following hand with both sides not vulnerable.
Sitting West, Jon held:

- J 『- 987654 KJ 10987 . And the bidding went:

Once Roger bid Michaels, showing hearts and an undisclosed minor, Jon wanted to bid up to the five level in their minor-suit fit. He bid 2NT to ask for Roger's minor.
Jon felt that with his minimal defensive prospects the opponents appeared to be headed for game or slam in spades. Nonvulnerable, Roger could have a very weak

hand, and this bid may keep the opponents out of six.
However, when the opponents competed to $5 \mathbf{a}$ and Roger doubled, Jon recognized Roger's Michaels bid was made with a strong hand.
"My partner is usually right when he doubles for penalty, and his double told me that he had a relatively strong Michaels hand," Jon said. "If he is counting on me for defensive tricks, he will be underwhelmed. It seemed like we would score better at IMPs on the range of hands that he might have."
Having a hand built for offense, Jon bid the $6 \star$ slam, which the opponents doubled. The opponents led the $\vee \mathrm{A}$, and Roger declared, holding:

- A4 Q 8643 AQJ 103 A

Roger ruffed the opening lead, and was able to make 13 tricks after the $\uparrow \mathrm{K}$ fell under his ace. Though 4a can go down as much as three, at the other table it was allowed to make, so this was worth 17 IMPs.

## Knockout phase

We finished the Swiss in sixth place and were shuffled to receive the 7 seed. In the first round of the knockout phase, we faced a team from District 22 in Southern

California that featured several young players - Emma and Finn Kolesnik and Jake and Luke Williams. Later at the Atlanta NABC, Emma and Jake's team from Harvey Mudd College placed third in the Collegiate Bridge Bowl, while their younger siblings won the National Youth Swiss Teams.
Our match with them was close, tied at the first quarter and them leading by 3 at halftime. We went on to win by 30

## Quarterfinal

That brought us to a quarterfinal match against a team from the Detroit area in District 12.
Frank and I sat against this year's Flight C North American Pairs pair winners, Henry Zhang and Yanping Zhang, who finished just ahead of our teammates Roger and Jon. We were both playing strong club systems, which led to a great number of IMPs being thrown back and forth every round.
In the last board of the match they bid up to an aggressive $4 \vee$, leaving Frank and me on the hook to defeat this contract. (see next column)

Frank led the K , to which I played an approving spot and declarer ruffed.

Declarer first played his $\boldsymbol{\Omega}$, and then led to his $\$ 10$ in dummy. I won my king and returned the J to prevent him from trumping a diamond.
Declarer took his two top trumps, and then led a trump to my queen. Declarer's play of the K looked suspicious. Whether singleton or not, declarer almost certainly had diamond length, and Frank might have a late diamond winner. The spades did not look like an immediate threat in any case, so I led a low club.
Having already lost a heart and a diamond, declarer had to play diamonds out of his own hand, which gave us two more diamonds, setting the contract.
By that point, though, we were up handily, winning 171-136.

## Semifinal

This advanced us to the semifinal round, where we faced a team from neighboring District 19. The match was never out of reach, and we led in the first quarter. After taking a $10-\mathrm{IMP}$ lead at halftime, they held onto it after a tied third quarter. It remained close but near the end of the fourth quarter it slipped away from us, and the final score was 135-111.
Our semifinal opponents went on to lose in the final to the District 23 team from Los Angeles.

## Navigating BBO - part 3:alerts



1 It's your turn to bid, and you realize the bid you're about to make requires an alert. In this case, partner has opened 1 NT and you want to transfer. Before doing anything else, click the alert button.


4 Once you select a level, the strains appear. Select the appropriate strain. In this case we want to bid $2 \checkmark$ to transfer to spades.


2 The alert button will turn red and a cursor will appear. Type an explanation for your bid here.


5 When you click the suit symbol, your bid appears in the auction diagram highlighted in yellow and outlined in red. The auction continues. Note that although partner alerted his 1NT bid as 15-17, you don't see his alert and he can't see yours.


After you have entered your alert and explanation, you are ready to select your bid. Once you bid, it's too late to alert. Select the level of your bid.


6 During or after the auction, you can hover over any bid highlighted in yellow to see the explanation. If there is a red outline but no yellow, you can click the bid to prompt the person who made the alert to fill in the explanation.

I will send out a letter to all the units with further details and then I will have a small group help me make the final decisions. I am going to look into a way to help the people in the Redding area, which is still suffering from the Carr fire.
Each year I am able to nominate two to four new members to the Goodwill Committee. If you know of someone who represents goodwill, send me a recommendation.

## The Longest Day <br> District 20 raises \$25,000

District 20 clubs, units and players raised more than $\$ 25,000$ for the Alzheimer's Association in events associated with The Longest Day in June Seventeen clubs and units participated, helping the ACBL raise nearly $\$ 1.2$ million. Contributions from D20 were up $57 \%$ over last year.
Leading the district once again was Boise Unit 394, which raised almost \$5,800, up 54\% from last year (see story, page 14).
The district's easternmost unit was followed by Unit 461, southernmost on the mainland, raising $\$ 3,225$, a $68 \%$ increase. The other southernmost unit, Hawaii's Big Island, came in fourth with $\$ 1,911$ from the Hilo Bridge Club.

Four Portland/Vancouver-area clubs participated, collectively raising $\$ 6,850$ led by Portland Bridge Club's \$2,441.
The largest percentage increase was by the Redding club, which tripled last year's effort with over $\$ 1,600$.
A pair of smaller clubs on the Oregon coast participated for the first time. Clubs in Bandon and North

Bend, 27 miles apart and attended mostly by the same people, raised $\$ 574$ and $\$ 500$ respectively.
Clubs had the option to hold games on the day of their choice, June 17-23.

## Don't be afraid to call a director

As a tournament director, my least favorite calls are those made after the fact or not made at all.
Sometimes well-intentioned players make decisions at the table without all of the facts or without a complete knowledge of the applicable laws. Players should call the director any time there is an irregularity or a procedural question.
It is much easier for directors to deliver rulings at the time of the irregularity rather than after things have progressed further. Calling the director is not calling the police; it is asking a neutral party, well-versed in the laws, to come to the table to help adjudicate a situation.
Here is hand that required a ruling from me on a recent game. Spades are trump and spots are approximate:


At the point in play illustrated above, South claimed the remainder of the tricks without mention of the outstanding trump or any line of play. Will South lose a trick to the trump?
Irregular claims are not infractions and are not subject to automatic trick adjustments or penalties like an established revoke. When a director is called to adjudicate a claim, it is her job to try to figure out what is most equitable for both sides, with questionable points being ruled against the claimer. But it is not an automatic windfall against the claiming side.
In the example here, I tried to figure out some details. For example, who is on lead? (South.) Was there a statement about the line of play made by declarer? (No, just some notion of spades/diamonds are good.) Did declarer mention outstanding trump? (No.) Did declarer's previous line of play show that he may have miscounted trump? (Yes, she pulled one and then stopped even though one was left.) Is there a normal line of play for declarer that would be unsuccessful? (No. Even if declarer tried to play the diamonds before the spades, since East is the defender with the length in diamonds, she has to follow to all of the diamonds before she would be able to ruff.)

So South's claim was allowed to stand, even if it was poorly stated.
Note: The ACBL Board of Directors recently decided to make the Electronic Device Policy consistent across all regional events. This will be a harsher policy than usual at D20 events. You can read about the policy here: https://tinyurl.com/y9yaf8y7.
Best advice: Turn your devices off when in the playing room.
