The Fall NABC for the ACBL was hosted by District 20 in Honolulu. Having a tournament in beautiful Hawaii was great. Unfortunately it was poorly attended. The playing site is terrific with plenty of playing

space, well lit, and the volunteers did a tremendous job.

Muriel Stitt from Honolulu was the tournament chair. Marie Ashton was the hospitality chair. These terrific women were honored with the ACBL district award for service to the ACBL.

The tournament agreement was signed more than 10 years ago with an estimate of 8,000 tables attending. The ACBL committed to a room block at the hotel for this attendance. The attendance was about 6,000 tables. ACBL was on the hook for the rooms and lost several hundred thousand dollars.

In the past, ACBL has signed contracts years in advance and we need to change our way of doing business.

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Hawaii results

Numerous District 20 players from Hawaii and a few from the mainland won regional and 299er events at the Fall NABC in Honolulu.

In the national events, the district's best event was the Super Senior Pairs, where Ed Ulman finished third playing with Jean Barry, followed by John Ashton and Dennis Metcalf in fourth.

The team of **Sherwin Moscow**, Connie Coquillette, Lisa Fishman, **Bob Johnson** and **Ed Lee** placed fifth in the 10K Swiss Teams. Moscow and Coquillette also placed 11th in the Mixed Swiss.

John Lusky played on a team that was eighth in the Reisinger, and Yasuko Shrenzel was on the team that was fourth in the Marsha May Sternberg Women's BAM.

In regional events, Mark Bennett won the Tuesday Open Pairs, and Ashton and Merlin Vilhauer won the Friday Open Pairs. **Tom** and **Katie** Fagan placed first in B in the Saturday Daylight Open Pairs, and Patrick and Penny Kallaus were 1B in the Sunday Fast Open Pairs. In our fair land of District 20, through my rose-colored glasses, I think things are looking pretty good. The board is strong, with new area representatives and Laurie Rowe serving a second term as president. Jeff Jacob is doing a great job providing board members with information and helping them make good decisions to plan better tournaments. McKenzie Myers is back in our area. With his extensive experience and insight, perhaps things will

get even better.

I see a lot of new faces. The schedule and variety of games being offered is reflective of the diversity of skill level and maximizes opportunity for those wanting to play. In Portland my local club offers lessons, assisted-play games, several limited games concurrent with open games,

> and is wonderfully crowded and full of energy. Often the limited games outnumber the open.

Being a relative youngster in the game of bridge, I sometimes hear things like, "Back in the old days ..." or, "We have always done it this way ..." While I certainly respect the history and commitment so many have made over the years, it may be time to look at new ways of doing things, especially since there are many new players who don't necessar-

ily have the same expectations.

It is definitely not a time for a one-size-fits-all approach. What people want is as varied as the people themselves. That is why I think offering food at large tournaments, especially when the bill is footed by the district or the ACBL (read: players) is a bad idea. I know bridge players get hungry, and they really like free stuff. At the nationals I was astounded when I saw hotel staff rolling out a buffet at 11 p.m. I was astounded and I wasn't expecting it. Eating is important, and to me, what I eat is important. So guess what? I bring my own stuff.

I know there are extenuating circumstances, like hotel contracts and negotia-

tions, that go into making these decisions, but thinking creatively and coming up with alternatives is what bridge players do. We could think of it as discovering a 5–0 trump split and coming up with a different line of play.

We can keep trying marketing strategies and surveys, but let's face it: it's a tough game to learn. It takes years — 10,000 hours minimum. Say you worked at it like a full-time job — that's over three years! Even the best players in the world make mistakes and get things wrong. A pessimist might think, "Why bother? I'll never get good at this." An optimist? "It's never too late to learn, to get better, to reach a goal, to make a change."

This year why don't you try to win an award? In this issue look at how the masterpoint races are split into categories, plus divided into total points and club points. You don't have to go to tournaments. Play locally and crush the Ace of Clubs category for your rank.

My hat is off to **Brian Breckenridge**. We were neck-and-neck in 2018 and I thought I had a chance to win the Mini-McKenney, especially now that road warriors **July Ratley** and **Dawn Campbell** moved into the next rank (congratulations!) but Brian won the Newport sectional and I could not catch up. I wasn't even disappointed, because I know there's always next time. It's not too late to start, and if you keep trying you might even win a medal.

Finally, a national with no flights required

Remember when I went months playing hardly any bridge? That hasn't been a problem lately.

Let's start with Hawaii. The trip there was long. I realized I hadn't planned well for the length of the flight when I finished the only book I'd brought halfway through the second flight (from Minneapolis to Los Angeles) with the longest leg still to come — not to mention the trip home. And I ended up at a tiny terminal in LA that didn't have a bookstore. Or food within my diet, but I survived that too.

I had requested one session off to play in an afternoon side game. But my partner for that fell through. I trudged back to the office, just in time to find the directors desperately trying to recruit a fill-in team for the first session of the Mitchell Open BAM. So, I got to play that afternoon after all, and for the first time in an event of tnat ievel, on a team with three ACBL board members. The bridge did not exactly go well -I played horribly – but it was nice to be there. The best part was meeting some cute Euro-

pean guys.

I spent a total of two hours on the beach, one on the first day and one on the last day. This was two more hours than I've spent on the beach at any other NABC — so let it be noted that I, too, am an optimist. And I would have had more than an hour the last day except I needed to go to the mall to find a bookstore, knowing it would be important to find something to read before arriving at the airport the next morning. Arriving at an airport early in the morning is hard enough.

Back home, I was showing up at the bridge club a lot more as I was practicing with a new partner in preparation for the Sin City Classic in Las Vegas in January. Normally, when I discuss a card with a new partner, we both offer a lot of options we don't end up playing, because nobody wants to try too many new things. But this time, with Tony, I found someone who agreed to basically everything. It was a lot

of new conventions for him to learn, but he did really well with them — except when they came up at the table.

There were still some bidding snafus, but they didn't detract from my enjoyment — or our scores, really. Finally, in the Sunday afternoon game, the last one playing with Tony, we won. Then I almost had to stay another day when my flight was canceled. You knew we weren't going to get through all of this without any flight troubles, right?

It was too late in the day for any other flights back to Memphis, and they wanted me to start over the next day. But I managed to persuade them to let me fly to Atlanta that night, where I'd at least be a lot closer to home when I started out the next day.

Since then, I've been to the club a couple of times for a monthly pro-am Swiss to play on a team with some fellow ACBL employees. I also played in a Memphis sectional for the first time in a year and a half. And there was also a quarterly game at headquarters recently.

Come to Memphis

Next is the Spring NABC here in Memphis. Because it's in our backyard, staffing is more flexible than usual for an NABC. They're giving me a couple days off to play, and Tony is relearning our system. I hope you'll come visit.

If you are going to be in Memphis and have a day to sightsee, I highly recommend the National Civil Rights Museum. If there are a few other things you'd like to do, don't try to cram them all into one day. Built on the site of Martin Luther King's assassination, the Civil Rights Museum will take about five hours to go through, but it's worth it. And the iconic Central BBQ is right across the street. I can't eat there, but you can.

I also recommend the ACBL Bridge Museum and the Rock 'N' Soul Museum, which is curated by the Smithsonian and offers an audio tour that also comes with access to a playlist of 100 songs. You can listen to the informational guide or just listen to the music. It's right at the end of the main block of Beale Street, so be sure to take a walk down Beale on the way. And of course, say hi to me.

ACBL expands GNT field for B, C flights

More teams can qualify if enough compete

There have been substantial changes to our online GNT finals. In Honolulu the ACBL board of directors opened up the national finals for flight B and C for a second team to represent districts. To be eligible, the district must have

eight or more teams in the district finals. Twice as many B and C teams can represent D20 and win gold points in Las Vegas this summer.

There also are changes at the district level. Flights A, B and C are now all one-day events. The only two-day final is in the open. So, come join us at clubs and bridge parties around the district and win the right to represent us in Las Vegas this summer.

The A and C finals will be held on Saturday, May 4. The B finals are on Sunday, May 5. The open is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, April 20-21. However, because that is also Easter weekend and the end of Passover, provisions have been made for teams to postpone the Sunday KO to a mutually agreeable

It is the district's policy to encourage players to compete in multiple finals. This year a precocious B player could play in three. I usually advise against C players playing in the open, but some have. The district subsidizes our repre-

> sentatives. However, the B and C subsidies have not been finalized because at the time of this writing our D20 board has not met since the national changes were made. The new subsidies will be available on our D20 website soon.

We have wonderful clubs throughout the district that have hosted our online events. It is pretty easy. All that is needed is reliable internet and somebody to serve as a monitor to ensure compli-

Monitors need not be directors and may not make rulings. The district com-

with free plays as long as there is a minimum level of participation.

We also have had our online finals in parties at private residences. Players get together at a friend's house and compete districtwide online to represent us at the nationals. The requirements are the same. Bridge parties need reliable internet and monitors.

Our online finals are regionally rated events in which you can win gold and red points. We encourage you to play in them even if you don't intend to represent us at the nationals. These are additional regional events you can play with no substantial travel required. It's a chance to play locally but compete regionally.

Please contact me if you need help forming teams or finding a place to play. Find a team. Find a venue. Have fun. Win points. And win a subsidized trip to Las Vegas to compete against players of similar strength as D20 representatives.

Sadly, the year ended with a \$22,540 loss for the district, which shows the need for the \$1 increase in fees voted for last year. Total tables for the year were 5,817, down 453 from estimate, which accounts for the loss.

We started off this year with attendance at the Oregon Trail that exceeded last year. Hopefully, you all will enjoy this year's other offerings. Jim Wheeler is planning interesting outings for Medford, and after are the ever-popular Eugene and Seaside tournaments.

The budgets for 2019 were approved, with one exception, for another projected net loss. The loss at about \$6,000 is smaller than previous years, due to the fee increase, but still a loss. The North American events budget remains to be approved, as a study is in progress regarding the expense reimbursement allocations among teams.

The board approved purchase of 50 Bridgemates and is entering into a contract with **David Taylor**, our equipment supplier to maintain and transport the machines. District 19 will also purchase 50, so that both districts have enough for their larger tournaments. This is a large outlay for the district, about \$6,000, which will further deplete our reserves.

Two new committees will study ways to decrease expenses and increase revenues. If you have any suggestions, you can forward them to me or to the committee members: Roger Thomas, Jim Wheeler, Irva Neyhart, Sam Asai or Mike

The district's STaC held in January was a success, with proceeds of about \$1.500. which will be shared with District 19, as they accounted for about one third of the total tables.

Since ACBL no longer allows us to give the proceeds from the Monday charity game to local charities, the board voted to send it to the Grass Roots Fund at the ACBL Foundation. This will enhance the amount we receive to support our North American players attendance at the NABC

Lastly, the board reelected Laurie **Rowe** as president for another year, as well as **Mike Eyer**, vice president, and Rich Carle as secretary. July Ratley was elected as the new treasurer, replacing Duane Christensen, whom we thank for a great job.

Movie Reviews

'Double Dummy' aims at recruiting youth

In January, the Portland area got its own screening of John McAllister's independent documentary about bridge, "Double Dummy." Inspired by a brainstorming session on how to get more young people involved in the game, McAllister has devoted much of the last several years producing and promoting the film.

The main story line follows the USA1 U-21 team in its bid for USA's first medal in the 2012 World Youth Team Championships. Tom Carmichael is the nonplaying coach and the team includes partnerships Adam Kaplan and Zach Brescoll, Adam and Zach Grossack, and Richard and Andrew Jeng. A backstory on these young competitors is provided. and viewers get a first-hand glimpse into comparing scores, decisions on player rotations, and the pressure of traveling and playing at an intense level.

Throughout the film, star-studded cameos explain and narrate subtle aspects that might be lost on a non-bridge playing viewer. The challenge of delivering complex material and maintaining interest is achieved with careful editing and the innate desire to root, root, root for the home team. My 11-year-old son, who staunchly declares he will never play bridge, stated at one point toward the end of the movie, "I still don't care about bridge, but I want to see if they win."

No spoilers here because this was an event that occurred seven years ago. Anyone who regularly reads The Bulletin or

goes to NABCs knows that these young kids have become older kids who can really play the game, and several have gone on to win national championships.

So how do we promote the game to young people? McAllister's film is a solid start. Perhaps if teachers showed it in their classrooms along with lessons after school it might stick to a kid or two. There are so many levels at which bridge can be played, and much more to it than just a game. "Double Dummy" illustrates that it's about community, growth, and connection just as much as it's about logic, statistics, bidding and play.

Although technology might be a way to hook a younger player, at its heart bridge is about sitting down with real people from all over the world and sharing a common interest. If each of us dedicated a fraction of McAllister's time, energy, and resources into attracting more players, our game's future would be bright indeed.

'Aces & Knaves': New film is slick as a knave

Several bridge-related documentary films have been in the works recently, and some are still in production. News of these films has been watched eagerly at the ACBL, where hopes are that they will serve as marketing tools that can draw people who might be interested in learning the game.

"Aces & Knaves" from filmmaker Jackie Paré of New York is the most sophisticated of the bunch to date, especially from a technical standpoint. The production values, sound effects and graphics enhance the storytelling to make for compelling viewing.

Focusing on top-level bridge, the film is divided into two parts, each referenced in the title. There are the "Aces" - worldclass and high-profile players who share their love of the game - and the "Knaves," the players involved in the 2015 cheating scandals that have inspired much of the

media attention on bridge since then.

While an early graphic presentation that explains the mechanics of the game is the only portion aimed directly at non-bridge players - and an exceptionally well done one at that - the story is accessible and, I would think, engaging to them as well.

The Aces section is especially enjoyable. Top-level bridge is full of interesting people, and we don't get enough opportunities to hear from the likes of Bob Hamman, Zia Mahmood or Steve Weinstein. Bill Gates brings some celebrity caché, and sponsors such as Vinita Gupta and Mike Levine offer unique perspectives.

Across these and other interviews, there's a lot of focus on how difficult the game is. It certainly gives you some perspective to hear five-time world champion Gail Greenberg say how often she thinks perhaps she isn't smart enough for bridge and should take up an easier game. Will those considering taking a bridge class be intimidated and change their mind? "Aces & Knaves" comes

down on the side of honest advertising.

One part that stuck with me compared bridge to the other mind sports. Whereas chess, backgammon and go are all individual games, bridge is the only one that is a partnership game. Intellectual ability is necessary to succeed at any of them. What sets bridge apart is that communication and social skills are also critical.

The Knaves section also has its highlights. Boye Brogeland and Brad Moss talk about how important it was to them to crack the codes used by the cheaters who have been convicted. For those unfamiliar with the story, it should make the film interesting. If, on the other hand. you've already read several articles and endless online discussion about the scandal, half of this hour-long film may seem like more than you need.

"Aces & Knaves" will premiere at the Spring NABC in Memphis with two showings on March 25. Distribution plans are still in discussion, so wider release is uncertain.

Laws of the Game

Dummy's limits

So you think it's easy to be the dummy when your partner plays a hand? In fact, dummy has many responsibilities, and even some rights. But there also are important limitations. Here's an overview.

Preliminaries

A player becomes dummy when a facedown lead by a defender is turned face up and the next player tables any of his cards. Note that if the opening lead is from the wrong

hand, the tabling of even one card by the intended declarer makes him now the dummy. You can prevent this from happening by promptly calling the director when there is a lead out of turn.

Who is responsible for dummy? What happens, for example, when one of dummy's cards has fallen unseen on the floor, or a diamond is hidden among the hearts, and there has been an unjustified revoke or other misplay? In duplicate, the declaring side is solely responsible for dummy. Thus, any irregularity caused by a mistake in displaying dummy's cards will cause the declaring side to be "offenders" and the defenders "non-offenders."

What May Dummy Do? (Law 42)

 Draw attention to a trick pointed incorrectly, but only before the lead

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Sherry's timely play: There goes my stopper

Sherry is feeling sorry for herself. "Why am I playing this game?" Seems like whenever she understands something like what an overcall is, then something else falls out of her head. Is it possible there's a limit to how much "bridge" fits in her brain?

At the beginning, it seemed like it was just a language, but now it seems like there's some logic that is just escaping her! Counting trump, stopping at the first trick to make a plan, leading your partner's suit — that seems so simple. When will I become good at

this game? Last year she gave up on a partner who would not lead her suit on opening lead. She really enjoyed her as a person and she enjoyed talking to her, but if you cannot lead your partner's suit really? And when she signaled her partner that she liked her suit


or lead, she switched! OMG, how could she continue playing with her?

That partner is gone. It is a partnership game and how can I be the best partner I can be? Back to my own problems, besides attempting to be a better partner.

This is a particularly painful admission. Today I bid 1NT holding ♠Q x x, and my partner passed, the expected spade lead appeared on the table. I sat and thought and counted my tricks. My lovely partner had put down the $\Delta J x x$, so I played small

spade from dummy. The 10 appears to my right, and I played small. What? They took the first five spade tricks. Everyone at the table laughed at me. What was I thinking?

A couple of hands later came this:



Partner raised my second suit to game, and what a perfect bid it was.

Pass

All Pass

If only I had played towards strength as I had been taught.

If you are a sensible animal, you stop and either count winners or losers before you play the first card. They led a trump. All I have to do is collect trump and lead toward my kings. What was I thinking?

So, on this one if you lose one spade, one diamond and one club, you make your contract. It just requires that you lead toward strength and the bridge gods will reward you.

Stephanie Owl's Advice

I will take a trick when offered it. I will lead toward strength.

This year the wuss is not playing in my head. I will treat is as a partnership game and only bid my hand. I will try to compliment partners and opponents for fine plays. I will try to play in tempo.

If I do not lead toward strength in the future, just take me out back and shoot me. I made a 0 percent play and led toward the ♠J. How many spades am I losing now?

Sometimes I imagine my partner to have the perfect hand to make slam. Then in the same round I can't imagine why I don't bid game because I'm being a wuss. This year I'm going to resolve not to be a wuss.

So, you pick up:



Why do I not bid 3NT? Just being a wuss. This year I shall live up to the promises I made myself. I will not play with any partner who doesn't return my lead. If you do not lead my suit. it is because you are void or have a better lead. I am going to make the bids that tell partners something and let them make the decision. No more jumping to game or slam when I can just describe my hand.



Stumbling into a cold grand

This hand was played in a national knockout team event. It is indelibly imprinted in my brain because of the bidding misunderstandings, the seemingly impossible contract, and the giddiness of making the grand slam.

Take a look at the bidding. I showed a balanced 22+ HCP, and my partner used Puppet Stayman to ask about my majors.

My 3♦ bid promised at least one four-card major, but no five-card major. Pard's 3♥ bid showed spades, and I confirmed the fit with my 3♠ bid. It was then that things went off the rail. Here's an explanation of the subsequent bids:



Jim Flint Play of the Hand

4♣: "What are your key cards?" (I thought he was showing a club control.)

4NT: "What are YOUR key cards?" (But he thought 4NT was an answer to HIS key card ask, telling him that I had two plus the

5♠: "I'm signing off!" (But I thought 5♠ was his answer to MY key card ask, saying he had two plus the $\triangle O$.)

7♠: Looked like a no-brainer to me. Dbl: West thinks he has a sure spade trick.

The dummy was tabled and I got the bad news. I took the opening lead with my ▼K and led a spade to the 9, East showing out. More bad news.


There was a glimmer of hope. After finessing West twice in spades, if I could strip the hand without West trumping in, I could make his "sure" spade trick disappear.

I cashed a second heart, three diamonds and three clubs, ending in my hand.

Laws: What dummy can and can't do

to the next trick is made.

- Ask declarer, but only declarer, about a possible revoke.
- Attempt to prevent an irregularity about to occur such as declarer leading from the wrong hand, by reminding declarer where the lead is. (But see the second bullet under "What Dummy May Not
- Give information, in the presence of the director, as to what happened at the table.
- Draw attention to any irregularity after the play of the hand, including calling the director at that time. This includes objecting to a claim or concession.

What May Dummy NOT Do? (Law 43)

- Initiate a director call unless one of the other players has already drawn attention to the irregularity.
- Call attention to an irregularity during the play, including pointing out a revoke or telling declarer that he has led from the wrong hand once the lead has been made. (The irregularity has already occurred.) Similarly, if declarer calls for a card from dummy (Law 45B), dummy should not correct the play. Note: either defender may accept a lead by declarer from the wrong hand, either by LHO playing to the trick, or either defender announcing acceptance of the lead. (Law 55A.)
- Touch or play a card from the dummy before declarer calls for one. (Law 45F) Nor should dummy hover over a card or suit or suggest in any way what card should be played. Even if there is only one card on the board in the suit led, the dummy should wait for the card to be called.

Other limitations

- In addition, dummy should not: • Ask for a review of the auction.
- Request an explanation of a specific
- Request an explanation of the defenders' carding agreements.
- Ask a defender about a possible revoke during play.

What Card to Play (Law 46)

How does dummy know what card to play when declarer does not specifically describe the card?

- ◆ If declarer calls "high," she is deemed to have requested the highest card in the
- ◆ If declarer says "play," dummy shall play the lowest card of the suit.
- ◆ If declarer says "win the trick," dummy shall play the lowest card that will take the trick.
- If declarer names a suit, but not the rank, she is deemed to have called for the lowest card in the suit. ("Play a heart" means play the lowest heart.)
- In leading from the board, if declarer calls for a rank ("Play the jack"), he is deemed to have continued the suit with which dummy won the preceding trick.
- If declarer says "play anything," either defender may designate the card to be played from dummy - unless the director determines that declarer's intent was incontrovertibly different from what escaped his mouth.

The Laws may sound complicated, but they're based on simple logic and ethical

Strategic Thinking

A power ratings system for bridge players

I would like to discuss a tricky subject that concerns all ACBL players, but also divides them: rating systems for players.

We currently have two ways to rate players in the ACBL. We can use the official and well-known masterpoint system, or we can use its lesser-known, unofficial alternative, Chris Champion's Power Ratings. The former is based on how many points you accumulate while playing over a certain period of time (one year for the Mini-McKenney and Ace of Clubs races, lifetime

when it comes to determine your flight). The latter is based on your average matchpoint performance over the past two years and is similar to the Elo chess ratings.

Unfortunately, it appears that a large majority of ACBL members follow exclusively the masterpoint system and are unaware of Champion's. Yet, both systems have advantages and are complementary. My goal is to make the Power Rat-

ings more popular among ACBL members, which I think would be beneficial to our bridge world. Here is why.

The current masterpoint system fulfills different missions. It creates a fun and relatively easy-to-understand challenge for everyone, from rookies to Grand Life Masters. It stimulates the attendance (if you don't play, you can't win masterpoints and masterpoint races) and is therefore a powerful marketing tool for the ACBL. It also helps with the seeding by giving you a vague idea of a player's level of play.

But this is where the main flaw of the masterpoint system appears: it only gives you a *vague* idea of a player's real level. We all know that our masterpoint earnings are not only linked to our level of play, but also to the level of our partners, our avail-

ability or our ability to travel to tournaments; not mentioning the influence of online play, where thousands of ACBL masterpoints are won each year. For those reasons and many more, it is pretty much impossible to measure a player's current level of play using masterpoints. And that's a huge downside of that system.

I wish the ACBL would use a dual method to rate players, just like the English Bridge Union does. In addition to the masterpoint system, the ACBL could use a

real rating method, where each player is given a rating based on recent performances, therefore measuring with a great accuracy their current level of play. The truth is, such a rating system already exists, but most players are unaware of it. If you would like to learn more about it, google "ACBL Power Ratings" or go to www.bridgepowerratings.com.

The Power Ratings were created several years ago by Champion, a Colorado-based player, who also realized the importance of having a true rating system for ACBL members. Since then he has been using all the matchpoint games from ACBL tournaments as well as some club games to give active players a rating.

Your rating is based on three factors: your game percentage, your partner's rating (the better your partner is, the less credit you will get for a good game), and the strength of the field or degree of difficulty (the stronger the field is, the more credit you will get for a good game and vice-versa).

These ratings appear to have a sound statistical basis. Another advantage of those ratings is that they measure your current level of play, as they are only based on your performances from the past 24 months. They can go up or down, with 50 the average rating. Being above 60 means you are a very good player.

The website also offers ratings for regular partnerships, using the same formulas. Those pair ratings are very interesting for a partnership game. I encourage you to check out this website, where you will find more definitions and explanations.

Of course, the Power Ratings system also has its flaws (team games are not included in the formulas, not all club games count, players who play very rarely don't have a rating, because it's difficult to evaluate their level of play), but it is still useful and more accurate than anything else.

The reason all club games are not included is because many club owners don't send their results to Champion. If you are among them, please take a few minutes each month to send him your game files. The website needs data.

So, until the ACBL is ready to develop a true rating system for bridge players, we can use these Power Ratings as a side rating system. Masterpoint awards and races will remain the same, with their benefits and their flaws; but being aware of the Power Ratings will at least give you a chance to measure with better accuracy your true level of play, no matter how much you can afford to play, in what events you play and with whom you play.

If we want to attract more younger working players, we need an accurate rating system, where playing only on weekends can be enough to have a high rating (assuming you are a good player). I can only see benefits in using both masterpoints and the Power Ratings as two parallel systems, each measuring something different but useful.



"Jim is a person who helps without being asked."

Partner Ron Senn agrees, saying Jim is the type of person who will do what others won't. "He's a great organizer and attacks tasks with a vigor that you rarely see without complaint. He is very active in the bridge community and often will sacrifice his playing time to help the game of bridge."

Wheeler, who started playing bridge in 1965 while serving in the Peace Corps in Turkey, says he was really surprised and honored to receive the recognition.

Contracts manager and longtime former tournament manager Marilyn Vilhauer has known Wheeler for 30-plus years. "This honor is about goodwill and if you know Jim, you know how friendly and helpful he is to everyone," she says. According to Vilhauer, as a tournament manger, Wheeler looks beyond just playing cards and wants everyone to have a good time. She describes Wheeler as a 75-year-old with the energy of someone half his age

Hormel notes that Wheeler is also an active member, often raising his hand to participate in events within the club and bridge community. "He currently is very active in all Ace of Clubs activities," says Hormel.

When asked what he loves most about this group, Wheeler says, "My bridge community is like family."

Ginny Kopacz

Next up, a bridge player who goes out of her way to educate others on the game — Ginny Kopacz of Portland.

Longtime friend Terry Strand has known Kopacz for more than 57 years, so she's pretty much an expert in her friend's qualifications to be a Goodwill member. "Ginny is a tireless worker and does a good job with whatever she undertakes," says Strand. "She spent many hours teaching students at Catlin Gabel School the basics of bridge, often giving up opportunities for her own games."

Nancy Jonske, who is also involved with the Catlin Gabel Middle School teaching program, agrees. saying Kopacz is known to encourage others to become even better players. "Ginny was ecstatic to become a Life Master and has continued to take lessons, encouraging others to do the same," Jonske says.

Jonske also used the word "tireless" to describe Kopacz's efforts as a member of the Unit 487 board. "She could amazingly organize hospitality for 200, and still volunteer to get all the pencils sharpened."

Kopacz says it was serving on the Unit 487 board as hospitality and education chair that first sparked her interest in doing more. "It was during this time I realized that more needed to be done to encourage and support newer and younger players. I remembered when I was a newer player how intimidating it was going to a club or tournaments. If we want bridge to continue to grow, we must continue to find ways to encourage our newer players."

On top of all her extracurricular work within the bridge community, Kopacz is also known to be a bright spot at the table. "Ginny is a very friendly, social person. She greets other players, and is truly interested in their lives," Jonske says. Strand says Kopacz is a very thoughtful person and sensitive to the needs of others. "Bridge is her passion. She well deserves recognition for her efforts in our bridge world!"

Kopacz, who began playing bridge in college, says it's become an integral part of her retirement. "I have met new and interesting people as well as made wonderful new friendships. The game is always a challenge and an ongoing learning experience.

"A very large thank you goes out to those who nominated me and felt that I was worthy of this," says Kopacz. "I am very grateful for this honor."

Suzanne St. Thomas

Finally, another player with a reputation for encouraging up-and-comers is Suzane St. Thomas of Boise.

Friend and opponent Irva Kay Neyhart met St. Thomas at the bridge table during one of her first duplicate games about 15 years ago. "She was a top-rated player and was so nice to me as a novice," Neyhart says. "I continued to admire her demeanor at the bridge table over the few opportunities I had to play against her."

Dave and Kathy Astle, who have known St. Thomas for more than 30 years, say she is a very generous and enthusiastic. "Suzanne was active in supporting our club, including helping us find new playing areas when we needed to move," the Astles said.

Neyhart also commends St. Thomas on always encouraging her. "I definitely think Suzanne deserves to be recognized by her peers by receiving this award as someone who has done so much to promote and encourage other bridge players," Neyhart

When asked why she goes above and beyond for the bridge community St. Thomas says, "I always try to play with anyone who asks, and I am always thinking of ways to have fun!"

But for St. Thomas, it was a total surprise. "I felt especially honored to receive it after knowing all those who have received it and what they have meant to the bridge community," she says.

On top of being an all-around good person, St. Thomas also has fun away from the game. "We always had dinner at great restaurants between sessions and I found out that Suzanne was just as nice away from the bridge table and a very fun dinner companion," Neyhart said. The Astles agree, saying. Suzanne is always looking for reasons to celebrate. "In other words, she's a lot of fun!"

St. Thomas confirms this point in one statement: "My personal philosophy is that all we have is each other. And we need to have all the fun we can."

Board meeting

Russ Jones from District 10 (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and most of Tennessee) was elected president of the ACBL for 2019. Russ has chaired the Bridge Committee for the past several years and was a former ACBL tournament director.

After an extensive search for a new ex-

ecutive director, the board hired Joe Jones. Joe has been the acting ED and was the CFO for ACBL the past six years.

The board voted to establish a masterpoint committee to oversee the changes in masterpoint awards. The committee will have ACBL staff members and three atlarge members.

The board decided not to change the opening notrump announcements, so keep announcing those ranges.

A motion was passed to increase the GNT teams to two per district if more than eight teams play. This is for Flights B and

C only. Let's encourage teams to participate and get two teams qualified. If this is a success, maybe we can do it for the other flights as well.

For the past several years, discussion on knockouts has been ongoing. We now allow reductions of bracket sizes to make the competition fairer without disproportionate reduction in masterpoint awards.

The board has been under a lot of pressure to reduce expenses and the size of the board. Some suggestions are to reduce the board to 9–15 directors. This would require some adjustments on how

districts are represented at the national level. We will keep you posted.

D20 tournaments.

District 20 has four tournaments this year: Portland/Vancouver in February, Medford in May, Eugene in August, and Seaside in September/October.

Boise celebrates life of Vern Nafus

Vern Nafus was playing cards at the duplicate bridge club in Montana when his daughter was born, a fact that his wife teased him often about over the years. But for Vern, who played his last hand of bridge last fall at the age of 103, the bridge club was like a home away from home. So, it was not an unusual place for him to be for that important family event.

Vern died Jan. 3, leaving a life well lived. On Jan. 25, the Bridge Cooperative of Boise – with four of Vern's five children present – gathered to celebrate his life and share stories about him.

Gretchen Wiggins recalled Vern asking her three years ago to go to dinner one Wednesday evening. Since then, they met weekly at the same restaurant, where Vern would tell her stories from his past 100 years.

Peggy and Gerry Silvester met Vern in the mid-1970s when Vern's wife Marty was still alive. Peggy's bridge day with Vern was the third Friday of the month. She remembered Vern telling her that when his wife took ill, Vern would go to the nursing home daily to feed her lunch and dinner and what a privilege it was for him to care for her

Kay Read played with Vern the third Wednesday of the month for years. She would brag to all of her friends about how bridge keeps your brain active, using Vern

as her example. Gary Cupper recalled that he was playing with him when Vern got his 2500th point for his Gold Life Master rank. Marilyn Edwards will miss him on her day. Anita Babineau's husband Al played regularly with Vern. After their game Vern would always call the house to see how they placed.

Daryl Sallaz noted that he was living proof that Vern would play with anybody! If Vern called him to play, he would make sure to shuffle his schedule to fit in an extra bridge game. Julia Christensen said he never lost his cool at the table and

could calm those of us who did. She also knew him from a Fit & Fall class. He knew the value of exercising and stretching to stay sharp and healthy. Rebecca Rodenbush never played with Vern but respected him as an opponent and admired him for how he lived his life.

When Vern turned 100, club member Candy Bonowitz painted a watercolor of him and his son Steve at the bridge table. He cherished it and

hung it in his bedroom. His children brought the watercolor to the club and hung it by his special table.

Once Vern asked Marian Hendrix how old she was. When she said that she was 74, Vern replied, "I've been playing bridge longer than you've been alive." Was bridge the secret to his longevity? He told Ian Martindale that the secret to his long life was that he never drank, never smoked, and always voted Democratic.

Whatever his secret was, he will be remembered as a great bridge player, an intelligent and thoughtful man, and a class act.

Impressive auction finds low-HCP 7♠

Bridge is a competitive exercise involving positive and negative reinforcements. A great deal of learning stems from exercises in errors of judgment, swiftly dealt with by vigilant opponents. Failures to cover; not leading partner's bid suit; or "What? Oh, darn! I forgot that dang Drury again!"

But sometimes you get a score of zero through no fault of your own. It's one thing that agonizingly occurs when the opposition manages to fumble their way into the only makeable contract that defies standard bidding conventions. Rueful rabbits! But once in a while, you must simply stand by and admire the bidding and play of a pair that has decided to "fix" your score, but good!

Here's a hand where (rotated) I was sitting East and my wife Linda was West. Trumpet Managing Editor Amy

Casanova was dealer, sitting South, and her partner was Paul Wrigley.

Following Amy's opening and Paul's game-forcing response, I, noting the favorable vulnerability and holding a good diamond suit with a stiff spade, enter the fray with a call of 3. That passed around to Paul, who set trump, prompting Amy to show her club control. They each cuebid their voids, followed by two more rounds of controls. Paul, now with a grasp of the hands firmly in mind, bids 7. They are the only ones there.

Next, the play. Linda dutifully leads a small diamond, Paul's cuebids notwithstanding. The diamond is ruffed with dummy's ♠10. Next, a small heart is ruffed. So far, so good. Then a club to dummy's queen. A second small heart is then also ruffed.

OK. Now a small spade to dummy's jack. A third heart, which is ruffed with the king. The ♣AK are now unnecessary, as Amy has a full count on the hearts, which are splitting 4–3. Her last spade is led to dummy's queen, and Linda follows, while I discarded. The ♠A draws Linda's third and final trump. The ♥A then drops my king, and the remaining hearts are good for the balance of tricks.

A grand slam bid and made, with 29 HCP. Twelve of those points in Amy's hand, the ◆KQ and the ◆AK, score NO tricks! Essentially, it was a 17-HCP grand.

Full credit and congratulations to Amy and Paul for their bidding and play. Well done. And next time, please be the pair that skips our table!

Seaside honors four for goodwill



ACBL tournament director Chris Wiegand answers your questions on rulings.

Q: I received a director ruling that was based upon a "peer poll." What does that mean?

Many director rulings are fairly routine — things such as leads out of turn, revokes, etc. Other rulings require far more judgment, such as situations that involve misinformation (MI) or unauthorized information (UI). In the past, the table director would use his own judgment about such situations to make a ruling about whether calls were (dis)allowed after UI or whether MI damaged the opponents. This means that the ruling would be based upon that director's bridge experience and judgment, which may be vastly different from the experience and bridge level of the player(s) in the "hot seat" at the table. While this may still be the case and a necessity at bridge clubs with a single (and possibly playing) director, at a modern ACBL tournament, we have different methods to solve these problems.

When tournament directors are presented with a situation that may involve judgment, they go through a checklist of items. First, they note the facts of the auction and the irregularity, for example, length of a hesitation causing UI, MI about agreements and what the actual agreements are for the partnership (if any), methods/system/style of the partnership both in the auction prior to the irregularity (choices available, which taken) and subsequent to it. Next, they determine the relative skill level/experience of the player(s) in the "hot seat" so that they can attempt to find other players of similar level/experience. Before they actually find those potential peers, they have to figure out what questions to ask. (This is frequently the most difficult part of polling.) Then they seek out players who are potential peers and ask questions.

They start them at the beginning of the auction. If at any point they vary from actions of the player(s) at the table, they may not be peers as they are not players who made the same previous choices. Assuming they are choosing similarly or can at least "live with" the previous decisions, they are presented with the information of the hand without the UI/MI so that the directors can get their unbiased decision at the critical juncture. Sometimes, once they get that unbiased opinion, they ask follow-up questions. That may be, "Suppose Bid X meant B instead of A as I told you before. Would your decision have changed?" or "Suppose partner took some time before selecting his previous call. Assuming the Laws would allow you to take any call you wished, would you still select the choice above or would another one become more attractive?"

Once the director gets a sufficient number of poll results (it varies), they tally the results to determine if "offenders" had logical alternatives or whether misinformation damaged "non-offenders" and attempt to determine if adjustments to the table result are warranted. Sometimes these adjustments involve a) leaving the table result as is, b) leaving it as is for one of the parties but adjusting for the other, or c) adjusting the result to a weighted average of other contracts/number of tricks taken.

And lastly, the director brings the results of the poll findings back to the players and make the score adjustment(s) as necessary. If a director pulls you aside and asks some questions, let me thank you in advance for helping with our polls — you are an integral part of making fair rulings for all of us.
